Mon., Oct. 5 Deadline For Vote Regs.

October 5 is the deadline for citizens to register to vote in the November 4 elections, Central Texas Congressman J. J. (Jack) Pickle noted this week.

"There is no excuse for not being registered to vote in Texas," Pickle adds. "Our state has one of the most progressive voter registration laws in the entire country."

The state election law permits registration until 30 days before an election. Voters can register in person, by mail or with a deputy registrar who is permitted to move throughout the county.

To register in person, call your county clerk's office, phone your county tax assessor and collector's office and a registration form will be sent to you. Or you can phone Congressman Pickle's Austin office, 512-397-5921, and an application will be sent to you. The form can be returned to the courthouse postage-free. There is absolutely no cost to you to register.

And young people also will find the registration process simple. You can register now if you will turn 18 on or before the November 4. The county will hold your application until your birthday and then send out your voter registration certificate.

To be eligible to vote on November 4, you must have a new white voter registration certificate—not the old yellow certificates issued in 1978 and 1979, Pickle advises.
