Dr. Gerald Birdwell Wins Dissertation Award

Dr. Gerald Birdwell was presented the 1980 George E. Briggs Dissertation Award for the outstanding doctoral dissertation in engineering psychology (human factors) by the Society of Engineering Psychologists at the annual meeting of the American Psychological Association in Honolulu. The award includes a bronze plaque, a cash prize, and the honor of delivering the Briggs Memorial Address at next year's annual meeting in Los Angeles. Dissertations nominated for this prestigious award are judged against a criterion of "original research exhibiting creative application of scientific inquiry in the area of engineering psychology." The annual award honors Dr. George E. Briggs, a pioneer in the development and teaching of engineering psychology. Interest permits subsequent users to estimate any time-probability point of information. Two useful types of information available to systems designers are (1) the amount of time necessary for any specific response completion probability, and (2) the probability of response completion in any specified time.

Because this scheme preserves the majority of experimental data collected in reaction time studies it greatly enhances the usefulness to present and future users of published laboratory data. Many of the confounding results of studies of reaction time under the influence of various factors (fatigue, stressors, alcohol) were traced by Dr. Birdwell to experimental reliance on individual means to the exclusion of other aspects of performance. Description of the distribution permits researchers to infer the mechanisms, psychological and physiological, underlying changes in performance.

This new point of view forms a key strategy to further study of the causes of accidents, and may be directly extended to biological and physiological research in the time domain as well. Birdwell voiced appreciation of the moral and financial support extended by Los and Gordon Birdwell and Neil and Howell Rowe, and of intellectual support extended by Dr. J. Baker of Georgia Tech and by Dr. Randall Chambers of the U.S. Army Research Institute.

1981 Feed Grain, Soybean Programs

The Secretary of Agriculture is required by law to make certain decisions on the 1981 Feed Grain Program by no later than November 15, 1980. Every effort will be made to make these determinations as soon as possible to allow feed grain and soybean producers additional time to plan their 1981 crop plantings within the announced program provisions. The public is being asked to advise the Secretary on policy decisions pertaining to 1981 Feed Grain and Soybean Programs, according to the County ASCS office. Policy decisions to be made are as follows: 1) Whether to implement a set-aside, and if so, the extent of such set-aside. An adequate feed grain carry-over level for the 1981/82 marketing year is estimated to be about 52 million metric tons (MMT). 2) Proclamation of preliminary national program acreage (NPA's). 3) Recommended voluntary reduction percentage from previous year's plantings. 4) Whether to place a limit on planted acreage if a set-aside is implemented. 5) Whether there should be a diversion program, and if so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment. 6) Whether barley and oats should be included in the 1981 Feed Grain Program. 7) Whether to require compliance with the established farm NCA. 8) The method used to adjust the established "target" prices from the 1980 crop levels. 9) The loan and purchase levels for the 1981 crops of corn, sorghum, barley, oats, rye and soybeans. 10) Other decisions relating to the operation of the loan and purchase program must be made by the Secretary. Federal Crop Ins. Ready To Implement Law

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) stands ready to begin immediate implementation of the provisions of the "Federal Crop Insurance Act of 1980" signed into law by the President, says Everett S. Sharp, Acting Manager. The new law will permit rapid expansion of the Federal Crop Insurance program from 1,670 counties and 28 crops into a nationwide "all-risk" insurance plan covering all farm commodities. Also included is extension for one year of the low-lying disaster program administered by the USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

"The basic plan is to expand into an additional 250 counties in each of the next five years with priority consideration given to counties which produce the basic disaster crops of wheat, cotton, corn, grain sorghum, barley and rice," Sharp says. "We anticipate announcing the initial 250 counties prior to planting of the 1981 spring crops. This will permit farmers to purchase 'all-risk' crop insurance on about 94 percent of all the acreage planted to these six disaster crops this first year," he adds.

A more gradual expansion is planned for 22 other crops presently insured by FCIC and all other crops and commodities will be included as rapidly as feasible and
