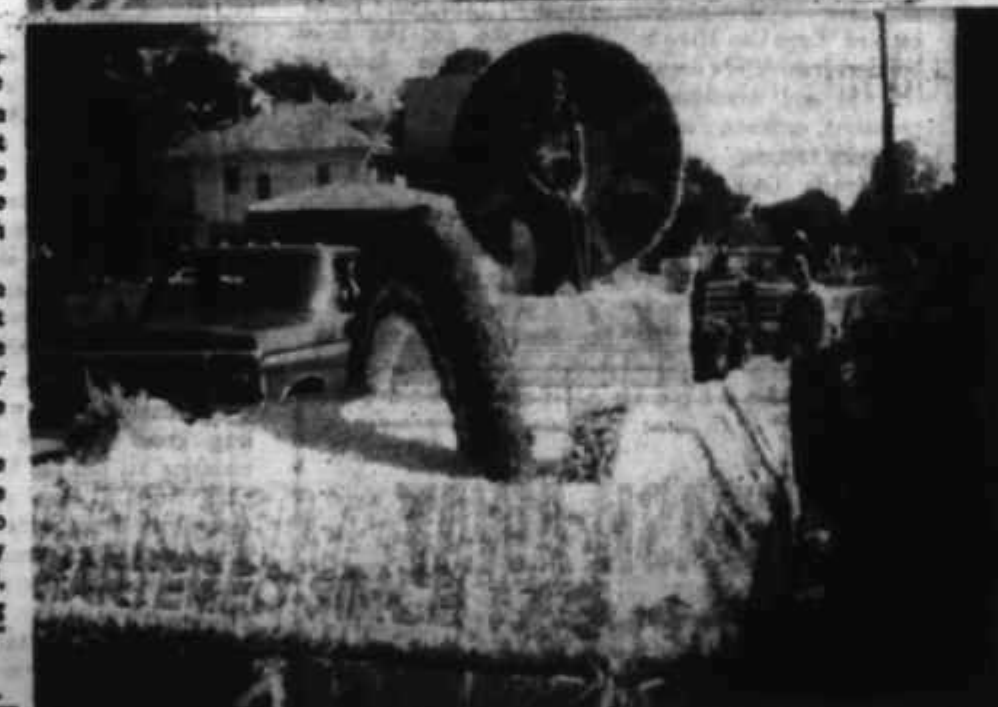

Petitions must be returned to the ASCS office by October 27, 1980," said Strickland.

The election calendar is as follows: October 27, last day for nominations by petition; November 27, ballots mailed to all known eligible voters; December 1, last day to return ballots; December 5, ballots will be tabulated at 9:00 a.m. at the ASCS office; January 1, new committee members take office.
