Suit Seeks To Complete Sale Of Property Here

A suit was filed in District Court in Columbus on October 15th by Ernest Lemons and wife against Vera M. Pellerin asking for delivery of a warranty deed on property which the Lemons were required to be buying from the defendant.

The petition sets out that an oral agreement was reached for Pellerin to sell Lot 7 of Block 3 and improvements in the Joe H. McCarty Addition of Eagle Lake for \$15,000. The Lemons say they delivered \$15,000 cash but that a warranty deed has not been delivered. It is stated that on Oct. 14th the First National Bank was instructed not to deliver the warranty deed.

The suit asks that the defendant be ordered to accept the \$15,000 selling price agreed upon and to deliver a sufficient and proper deed to the property to the plaintiffs.

Suit Asks Temp. Injunction For Diverting Water

Frank E. Pinner and David Pinner filed a suit in District Court Oct. 16th against Smith Industries, Inc. seeking an injunction and damages for allegedly diverting the flow of water on property owned by both parties in the McCarty League.

Frank Pinner owns 41.56 acres, David Pinner 1.5 acres and Smith Industries 83.347 acres in the area.

The plaintiffs allege that the defendant has changed the contour of the land with buildings and improvements and altered the flow of water from its natural course onto their property.

They allege the defendant is in violation of statutes of the State of Texas and ask for a temporary injunction to restrain the defendant from continuing such action and for actual damages and exemplary damages and other relief.

Civil Suits Ask Injury Comp., Wreck Damages

In two civil suits filed in District Court this week, a settlement is asked for injuries received in an accident; and another asks for damages to a vehicle resulting from a wreck on FM 102.

In a suit filed Oct. 20 styled John H. Denley vs. Southern Life and Health Insurance Co., Denley says that he was injured on Mar. 23, 1980 while employed by Smith Industries and while covered by a policy from the defendant company.

He asks for a settlement of \$12,125 plus 12% interest and costs of court and attorney's fee for the period during which he was hospitalized, April 23-May 16, from the defendant company.

In a suit filed Oct. 20 by Silvino Lopez against Ricci Shay Poni and R.P.M. Swabbing Service Inc. Lopez seeks \$2,818.44 in damages which he alleges was received by his vehicle when in collision with a vehicle driven by and owned by the defendants. The accident reportedly occurred at 8:15 a.m. April 23 while driving north on FM 102.

Airport's East-West Runway Topic Of Council Meet Tues.

Airport Operation, Use Policy Also To Be Discussed

The fate of the East-West runway at the Eagle Lake Airport is expected to be determined at the next meeting of the city council on Tuesday night, October 28th, and at present it appears the decision could result in shut down of the runway.

The council plans to make a decision at that meeting and invites anyone interested in voicing any opinions to be present at that time.

The strip which runs parallel with Airline Road is owned by the city and the airport. Complaints voiced by citizens in that area have limited use of that runway, but now because of its current condition, the runway may be closed permanently.

"The condition of the runway is not good," according to airport committee chairman Roy D. Van Noy. "Grass grows up in cracks and potholes are in desperate need of repair and cost of such a project to put it back in good condition would cost anywhere from \$50,000 to \$100,000."

Because of the enormous repair cost and because of citizens of that area voicing complaints in the past, it was the recommendation of the committee to shut down the runway. It was also suggested that T-hangers could be constructed alongside the runway and be rented to pilots desiring temporary shelter for their aircraft.

Because of the upcoming hunting season the committee recommended that repairs to

on downtown area streets and stipulates penalties for such acts.

Streets designated in the ordinance include: Main St. from its intersection with Bothe Drive near Eagle Market; West to McCarty Street; McCarty Street from its intersection with A Street near Wilcox Minimax, north to Post Office Street; and Commerce Street from Main Street to Post Office Street.

The ordinance as approved on the first of three readings is published on page 9.

The second reading of the ordinance is slated for the council's Oct. 28th meeting with final approval anticipated at the Nov. 11th session. Upon final approval local law enforcement officers will be instructed to enforce the ordinance which stipulates such acts as a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of not more than \$200.

Wastewater, with primary responsibility for the water plant, sewer, water distribution system, planning inspection and will serve as an assistant to the Director of City Services.

"With the selling of the gas system (which consumed an enormous amount of city employees' time) and the vacancy in the Public Works Director position, the City has an opportunity to lay the groundwork for an organization that will be better able to respond to the responsibilities of the City," said Klockman as he presented his proposal to the council.

"Traditionally, the City has operated with essentially one crew that jumped from one activity to another, depending on the crisis."

Using one crew in those crisis situations, according to the city manager, has not provided the opportunity for continuity of effort to solve problems but has many times required a quick patch rather than a permanent solution.

By dividing the responsibility among the city manager and the two new positions, says Klockman, the first step in providing of primary assignments of crews is being taken.

Under the reorganization, Klockman will assume overall administrative responsibility for the Public Works section, with shared responsibility in the areas of planning and long range scheduling. The two Directors are responsible for the day to day operation of their respective areas along with shared planning and scheduling responsibilities.

These two Directors, Klockman adds, "are foremen for their respective crews which include not only supervisory but also technical expertise and heavy machinery operation."

The city manager concluded his proposal, prior to council approval, by stating that both men have assumed a lot of the responsibilities designated to the Public Works Director position since it became vacant and both have proven quite capable with the extra load. He anticipates the more successful performance from them in their new positions.

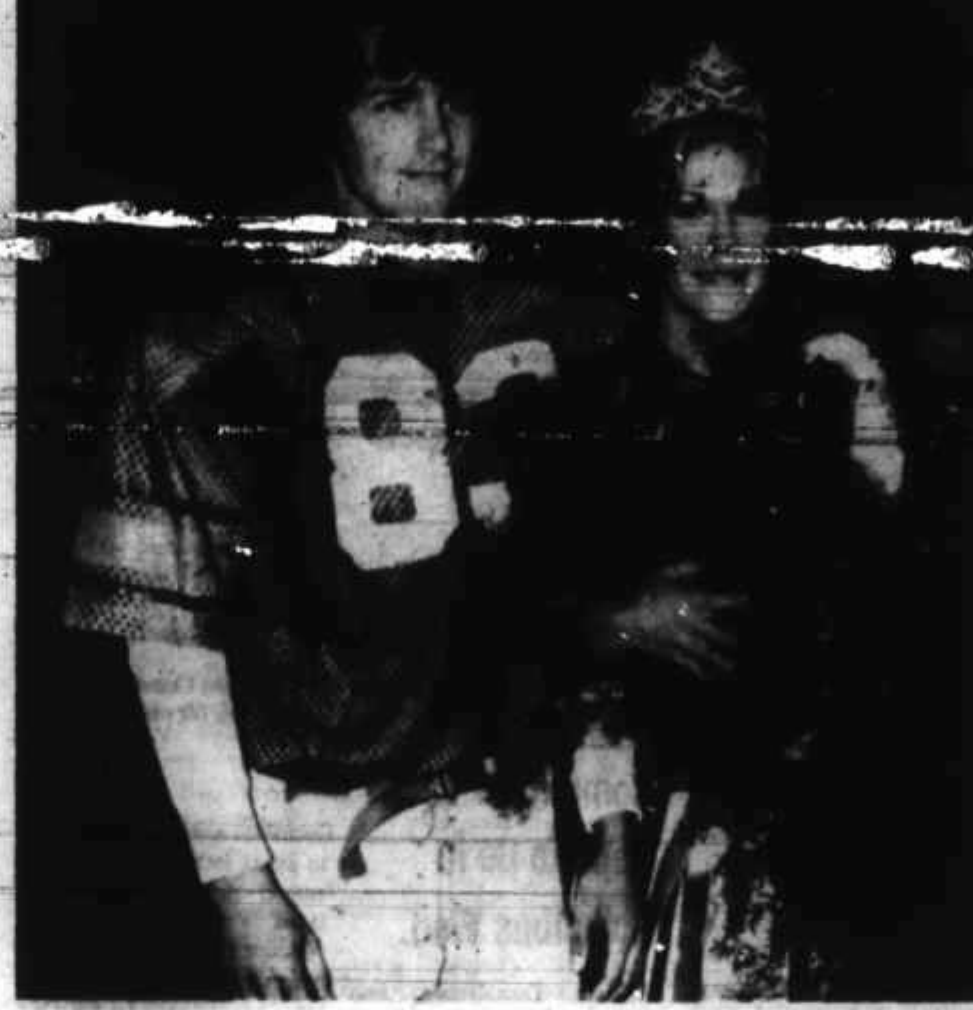

Heavy Voting Expected In Gen. Election Tues.

Voters To Elect President, Vote Here In Comm. Center

Voters are expected to go to the polls in heavy numbers next Tuesday, Nov. 4th in the General Election to participate in the selection of national, state, county and precinct officers and to decide the fate of nine proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in eighteen voting precincts. Absentee voting will end this Friday, Oct. 31st.

Absentee voting has been running fairly heavy with a total of 958 signed up to vote absentee by our deadline Wednesday morning. This compares with just over 500 in 1976 and 270 in 1972.

The absentee ballots may be applied for in the office of County Clerk Lester Schneider in the county courthouse in Columbus from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. through this Friday.

In Eagle Lake the voting in the 10th Precinct will be done by the Eagle Lake Community Center with H. E. (Ed) Tate presiding judge and Harold Thomas the alternate judge.

For other voting precincts and election judges see story on page 12.

In 1976, the last presidential election year, a total of 8072 votes were counted for presidential candidates, as compared to the total of just over 8000 qualified to vote in the 1980 election.

Presidential Race

Interest in Tuesday's election centers around the campaign for president of the United States between the incumbent Jimmy Carter and the Republican challenger Ronald Reagan. Also listed on the ballot are Libertarian Party candidates Ed Clark and Independent Party candidate John A. Anderson.

The running mates for vice-president are Democratic Walter Mondale, Republican George Bush, Libertarian Ed Bradley and Independent candidate Milton S. Eisenhower. There is also room on the ballot for write-in candidates.

Vote On Sewer Bonds Unanimous

Citizens of Eagle Lake, in very light voting but conclusive voting, approved issuance of \$500,000 in bonds for the construction of a new sewer plant and other sewer improvements in this community.

Only 71 voters went to the polls in the Municipal Building Saturday and every one of the 71 was cast for the issue, none against, reported presiding judge H. E. Tate.

The action will authorize the City Council to proceed with the issue of the general obligation bonds to be retired from revenue from the water and sewer department, as the city's 27th matching portion for costs of the plant construction. The remaining 1996 is expected to come from federal sources.

Returns of the election were canvassed and approved in the council's regular session Tuesday night.

The Texas Dept. of Water Resources had requested a response from the city early in November on whether or not the city's matching funds would be available, and the action of the voters last Saturday assured that.

Rice CISD Bd. Awards Ins. Contract

The Rice Consolidated School District's board of education met in special session at 8 a.m. Monday to open bids for insurance on properties owned by the district. The policy on the properties was due to expire Monday.

The board considered two bids, and accepted the bid of Eagle Lake and Strickland Insurance Agency to provide the coverage for \$14,370. The only other bidder was W. M. Thomas, Jr., Insurance Agency of Eagle Lake, which offered coverage for \$16,000.

Rice Market Improves; Most Rice Being Sold

The second crop of 1980 rice is nearing completion and the yields have been good and quality of the rice better in many cases than for the first crop rice, hence the price being offered for the rice is improved.

Donald Overman, manager of the Eagle Lake office of the American Rice Growers Cooperative Association, said that 12 of the 21 lots of rice offered for bids on Wednesday of last week were sold on Wednesday of this week with about 30 lots going up for bids.

The market has shown some improvement since the opening of the 1980 harvest and much of the rice is starting to move to the mills.

Top bid of the day last Wednesday was \$13.25 per hundredweight, offered by Rivauna Mills for two lots of Louisiana rice.

Overman said this week that some mills are offering over \$14 per Cwt. for second crop rice. He estimated that less than 100,000 Cwt. of the 1980 first crop total of 245,000 Cwt. remains unsold at this time.

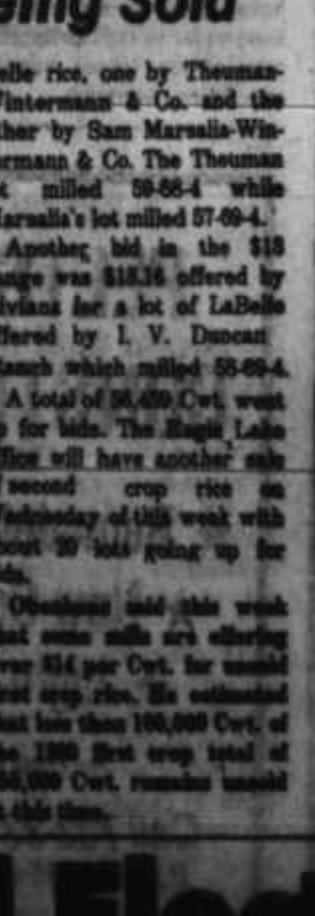
Rotary, Lions Clubs To Lead First Wave Of Consol. Fund
