Highway 71 To Be Widened S. Of Altair

Funds Cut Back For Non-Compliance With Bidding Regs.

Contracts totalling over \$1,179,000 for highway improvements in Colorado, Jackson, Victoria and Wharton Counties have been approved in Austin.

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission approved bids on four projects in the nine-county Yoakum district. Bids were submitted by contractors during the department's

Yoakum District Engineer Carl Ramert said the following contracts were approved:

Colorado County: State Highway 71 will be reconstructed and widened from U.S. Highway 90A at Altair southward 2.1 miles. Existing 10-foot travel lanes will be widened to 12 feet, and the Skull Creek and Skull Creek Relief Bridges will be widened to provide a 40-foot roadway width. The intersection of S.H. 71 with U.S. Highway 90A will be reconstructed to improve turning movements of through traffic.

Clyde E. Schulz of Wharton is the department's engineer supervising the project.

The November highway construction letting has been cut back greatly because of a government freeze on Texas allocations from the federal highway trust fund.

The U. S. Department of Transportation imposed the freeze because it maintains Texas is not in compliance with new bidding procedure regulations. The new regulations would preclude participation by contractors who

failed to meet fixed percentage requirements of subcontracting by minority business enterprises.

Texas law requires competitive bidding for highway jobs. The contract must be awarded to the qualified bidder submitting the lowest bid. Rejecting the low bid because of inability to meet the new DOT regulations would violate the state law requiring the low bidder to receive the contract.

The immediate impact of the freeze is that approximately \$100 million worth of highway work that was to go to contract in November has been taken off the letting schedule. A freeze on allocations in December also may be pulled.

Trespassing Charged In Theft Of Tape Deck

A San Antonio man was arrested Sunday and charged with criminal trespassing in the theft of a tape deck from a pickup truck owned by Whymen Paenick of Mentz, and parked at the railroad yard in Glidden. Paenick, who works for Southern Pacific Railroad informed the sheriff's department at 2:20 p.m. Sunday that his tape deck was missing. Investigation by officers revealed that there were three unauthorized persons in the area at the time of the theft. One subject was located attempting to get on a railroad car and he had the tape deck in his possession. The other two subjects were also located, however, it was determined that they had nothing to do with the theft and were released.

Railroad officials filed criminal trespassing charges against Gilbert Zepeda, 19, of San Antonio. Zepeda entered a plea of guilty in the court of Justice of the Peace Richard C. Schmidt and was assessed a fine of \$60.50. The tape deck was returned to Paenick.

Two Louisiana men found themselves in a lot of trouble when they fled from a Department of Public Safety officer at speeds up to 115 miles per hour on Interstate 10 at around 3 p.m. Monday.

The county sheriff's office reported that DPS Trooper Tim Nielsen of the inspection station of the Pierce DPS office, observed a vehicle traveling west on IH-10 near the rest area west of Columbus. Nielsen was going east so he turned around for a routine inspection when the driver of the vehicle started driving at a high rate of speed. Nielsen chased the vehicle at speeds up to 115 miles per hour until they were in Flatonia. The fleeing car heated up and was forced to stop.

A check of the vehicle revealed that it was stolen from New Orleans, La. on Oct. 26th. Both subjects in the car, a 1973 Ford, were arrested and returned to Colorado County where the chase started and were charged with auto theft.

Arrested were Ronald Jacks, 19, and Michael Smith, 18, both of New Orleans, La. The driver of the car, Smith, was also issued citations for speeding, running a stop sign when leaving the interstate at Flatonia, for fleeing from a police officer, no driver's license, and unsafe changing of lanes. He was fined a total of \$345.50 by Justice of the Peace Richard Schmidt. Both men remain in the County Jail waiting disposition by the Louisiana authorities.

The City of Eagle Lake will conduct a public hearing at 7:30 p.m. next Tuesday, Nov. 4th to advise the general public about the 1981 Community Development Block Grant Program. The program is administered by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The hearing is required as part of the city's application for community development block grant funds for drainage and rehabilitation in the Rice Mill Area. The hearing will be held in the Providence Baptist Church at 1207 East State Street.

Garwood Post Office Announces Change In Hours

Showers and thunderstorms are forecast over the Coastal Plains as overrunning conditions have set up behind the cold front. Strong north winds are bringing polar air into the region. Lows dropped to the upper 30s in the upper Rice Belt Tuesday night. Wednesday night could be cooler still, especially if skies clear. Thursday through Saturday should be fair with mild days and cool nights.

In the Rice Belt . . . harvest operations in second crop rice, soybeans and peanuts will remain at a standstill for at least the next couple of days. Fields will be rather slow to dry as cool air continues to pour into the area. Winds should decrease Wednesday, but sprayers may still face a risk of wash-off until Thursday. Cold, damp, windy weather tonight may stress cattle since they are not accustomed to such conditions. Consider feeding birds, especially young or sick animals, a high energy supplement to help them cope with this first episode of cold stress.

In the Coastal Bend . . . small grains should make good growth the latter half of the week as sunshine returns. Winds should decrease enough Wednesday to permit armyworm spraying to resume. However, wash-off will still be a threat. Cattlemen should consider giving young or sick animals supplement feed to help them deal with damp, chilly, windy weather tonight.
