

Former Texas Ranger Gets 10 Yrs. TDC

Kenneth Wayne Fricke, a former Texas Ranger and a former highway patrolman in this county, received a sentence of ten years in the Texas Department of Corrections week before last for violating the civil rights of a Seely railroad engineer. Fricke was employed with the DPS for over twelve years. The penalty assessed against him was reported to be the stiffest ever given to a law enforcement official in the Southern District of Texas for civil rights offenses. Fricke and Terry Manning, former sheriff's deputy in this county, were convicted in May of beating Larry Michael Hints, 49, in a deserted field

near Wallis Feb. 26, 1979. The incident occurred after the two officers arrested Hints after a disturbance at a bar in Wallis. They reported by took Hints in handcuffs to the deserted field where the beating occurred.
