The noise had been a big concern of area residents about two years ago before any guidelines controlling aircraft activity had been adopted by the council.

Due to the concern for the noise and for other hazardous traffic activity at the airport the council set up guidelines which included limited use of the East-West strip.

According to the residents last week, they are very satisfied with the results that the guidelines have brought and expressed their appreciation to the local pilots for abiding by the rules.

The council reviewed the rules during the session and with the agreement of both aviation representatives and residents, no changes were made.

Other members of the neighborhood present at the meeting included Mrs. Art Arpa, Mrs. J. M. Martin Herman, Mrs. Jack Leopold, Mrs. Wayne Lippert and Lonnie Sommerlatte.

Others present included David Wintermann, who donated the land for airport use; Don Thornton, and the application firms, B. J. Williams, John Garza and Eugene Shanks, Jr.

Recommendations Exploined

Van Nurt explained his committee's recommendation saying that it had been based on the economics of the matter and had not been looked at from any other point of view.

"The budget for this year has not been stretched," he pointed out the councilman, adding, "we had not said that the runway would be closed but it was our thinking that it would be the best move."

Councilman Ralph Truly, another member of the committee, said that he still had doubts of whether a new slice of Eagle Lake could maintain two runways, but was willing to try.

"I've been around airports for 31 years and am not in favor of closing one just to be closing it," said Truly. "I've seen some ways to maintain both runways, but I'm in favor of keeping the East-West open."

Because of the unusually large response of citizens requesting council action, it was agreed to leave the runway open. Some speculation on a priority basis in the East-West strip with no major work expected for about a year.

Saunders of La Grange who soundly defeated Republican challenger Earl Gallop. Saunders will fill a position vacated by John Wilson as Representative in the 30th District, including this county, to run for a state senate office. Alamo Democrat Capt. Caperton defeated Republican nominee N. A. McNeil for the state senator's position in the Fifth District, a position held for many years by W. T. (Bill) Moore who lost the Democratic nomination to Caperton.

Wilson, Democrat of La Grange, reportedly was running well ahead of Republican Bill Rucker of Georgetown for the state senate in a position vacated by Bill Patman who was said to be running ahead in his bid for a seat in the United States Congress. Patman was defeating Republican C. L. Cookfield for the congressional position in district 14. A small portion of the southern end of this county is in the 14th congressional district and the vote was 551 to 230 in favor of Patman.

In Eagle Lake, Piggie received 729 votes, Biggs 376 and Greenberg 3; for state representative, 30th district. Saunders-poll-713 and Gallop 346; and for state senator, 5th district, Caperton received 696 and McNeil 367.

Eagle Lake Voting.

H. E. Tate, precinct election judge, said that 150 registered voters live in Eagle Lake out of the 1750 voters in the precinct, which spreads almost to Altair and Iliio. The 561 voters polled by the students would then represent about 46% of the eligible voters and is an indication of the enthusiasm of the students in the project. For whatever reason, three of the class precincts showed low voter participation; those precincts have a large minority population.

Mrs. Spanziel expressed pride in the agreement with which these students undertook this project. Each of the precincts was rather large so the entire community could be polled, and this required the cooperation of parents who, in a number of precincts, had to drive the students through the area.

"While learning about mathematical concepts such as statistics, percentages and probabilities, these students had an opportunity to see democracy in action as well as get a taste of people's personal reactions to a very private aspect of their lives," she stated.
