ASCS Lists Procedures For Filing Disaster Claims

Corn and wheat crops damaged during weather conditions this summer may be covered under the disaster payment provisions of the 1980 farm program.

Payments are authorized for a farmer whose crop yield is less than 60 percent of the established yield for corn and wheat. "This payment is based only on crop production losses below 75 percent."

The ASCS official advised farmers to keep crop production separate by farm and to include weight tickets or FCIC form 74 when submitting disaster claims.

When you see signs like those shown above, they tell you that there's a pipeline nearby. If it's underground, you can't see it, of course. But it's there, working quietly to provide energy for you and other consumers throughout this nation.

Some of these signs list the commodity transported in the pipeline, the name of the operator, and a telephone number where the operator's representative can be reached at all times.

Although pipelines have an exceptionally good safety record, once in a while a leak can occur. Indications of a leak might include:

- A strange or unusual odor in the vicinity of a pipeline.
- A hissing or roaring sound (caused by petroleum or product escaping from a pipeline).
- A dense white cloud or fog.
- A spot of dead or discolored vegetation.
- An accumulation of petroleum

liquids on or a mist above the ground in the area of a pipeline.

Flames originating from an opening in the ground.

If you become aware of a pipeline leak:

- LEAVE THE LEAK AREA IMMEDIATELY.
- Avoid driving into vapor clouds.
- Avoid direct contact with the escaping liquids.
