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5 Pay Fines For Illegal Deer Hunting

Five hunters paid fines for illegal hunts during the opening week-end of the 1980 deer season, reported Parks and Wildlife District Supervisor Sam Center.

Game Warden Leo Kohlel of Columbus arrested Richard H. Noppe of Houston at around 7 p.m. Saturday west of Weimar and charged him with killing an antlerless deer without a permit. Noppe was fined \$200 and costs in the court of Justice of the Peace Joe Kaye of Weimar on the antlerless deer charge and another \$100 and costs on a trespassing charge.

Illegal deer hunters Saturday morning, Julius Riles of Houston was arrested on the Alamo Estate near the Tail Ranch. The man reportedly had the cut-up body of the deer in possession and the head was located in woods nearby and he was charged with possession of an untagged deer and was given a \$50 fine plus costs in the court of Justice of the Peace Richard Schmidt of Columbus.

Two men were charged with hunting deer from a public road at 3:30 p.m. Saturday when Center arrested William M. Walter of Houston and James R. Perrill of Eagle Lake for hunting on County Road 101 on the Potter Ranch. Each paid a \$100 plus \$13.50 cost fine in the court of Justice of the Peace Schmidt.

Irvine H. Jardine, Jr. of Houston also paid a \$100 fine plus \$13.50 costs for possession of an antlerless deer without a permit. Judge Schmidt's court. Jardine was arrested on the Mielow Ranch with a nubbung deer which is not considered to be a spike buck, at 7 p.m. Sunday.
