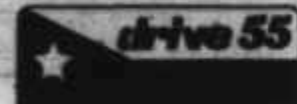

Duck Season Ends At Sunset Sunday

All Geese Remain Legal Targets

The first segment of the 1980-81 duck season will come to an end at sunset Sunday, Nov. 29th; however, all geese remain in season.

Ducks and geese became legal targets on November 8th and the season has been reported as a "fairly good one" to date. Ducks have not however been present in this area in the numbers which normally prevail. Also the number of geese is also expected to increase as the cold winter weather moves into the United States.

Ducks will be out of season through December 31st and will become legal once again on Saturday, Dec. 13th, 1980. All geese, including snows, blues, Ross, Canadian and Speckled Belled (White-fronted) geese, remain in season from the Nov. 8th opening date through Sunday, January 18th, 1981. The limit on geese is six.

but the daily bag limit can not include more than one dark (Canadian or Speckled Belled) goose. The possession limit is two days' kill or a maximum of two dark geese and ten snows or blues.

Rail Season Ended
The season on rail and gallinules closed Nov. 9th. Woodcock remain in season from Nov. 15 through January 18th with a daily bag limit of 5 and possession limit of 10; and Jacksnipe are in season through Feb. 15th with a daily bag limit of 5 and possession limit of 10.

Quail are also in season with a daily bag limit of 12 and possession limit of 36. Shooting hours for migratory birds are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Deer season continues in Colorado County with a limit of one buck (including a spike) and two does, but the antlerless deer may be killed only through a special permit issued to landowners in two designated areas of the county.



Deer Hunt Has Plenty Of Perils

So you're going deer hunting pretty soon. Before departing for the woods, you should take time to read the following, play-by-play description of one deer hunter's experiences:

1 a.m. - Alarm clock rings.
2 a.m. - Hunting partners arrive, drag you out of bed.
2:30 a.m. - Throw everything except kitchen sink in the pickup.
3 a.m. - Leave for the deep woods.
3:15 a.m. - Drive back home and pick up gun.
3:30 a.m. - Drive like a madman to get to the woods before daylight.
4 a.m. - Set up camp. Forget the tent.
4:30 a.m. - Head into the woods.

Hearing Scheduled Dec. 8th On State Control Of Wildlife

Comm. Ct. Has Motion
On Table To Request
Removal Of P&W Controls

A public hearing has been called at 1:15 p.m. Monday, Dec. 8th by the Colorado County Commissioners' Court to consider the adoption of a resolution requesting that this county be removed from regulatory powers of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission and place the county under the general law status. This would mean that

the Texas Legislature would set the wildlife rules for Colorado County rather than the Parks and Wildlife Department, commented County Judge Lester J. Cranford.

A delegation of citizens from the northern part of Colorado County appeared before the court at the Nov. 10th hearing and requested that such a resolution be sent to the Texas Senate-elect Kent Caperton and State Representative-elect Rich Sanders for possible implementation in the next session of the Texas Legislature.

The court, presided by Commissioner Crockett Layton, and Precinct 10 Commissioner Otto Loessin, but before a vote was called, the court adjourned. The court tabled the motion until after the hearing on Dec. 8th.

Those present at the Nov. 10th session took issue with the killing of deer with contributed this as a factor in the great decline of deer in this county in recent years. Fear was also expressed that if the deer population continues to decline so will the opportunity to lease properties to deer hunters.

Loss Much Of Quail Season
In the event the county was removed from state regulation and placed under general law, the quail season would be considerably less number of days as under regulatory control. Under regulatory control, the season this year runs from Nov. 15th through Feb. 15, 1981. Under general law, the season would not open until Dec. 1st and end on January 31st.

Parks and Wildlife biologist Royce Jurries, in speaking before the Eagle Lake Rotary Club last week, commented that the reduction in the number of deer in this county corresponds proportionately to the number of acres of land which was deer habitat but has been converted to farming land, residential development, highway construction, etc. Jurries said, "the ratio of deer per acre remains almost constant. You can't expect much increase in deer population considering the loss of many acres of deer habitat."

Biologists have stressed that controls on deer are needed in order to maintain a good reproductive balance and still provide large deer with large horns.

Colorado County was removed from the regulatory authority and placed under general law in 1969, under a bill introduced by State Rep. Charlie Jungmuhl at the urging of landowners in the Columbia and Weimar areas. At the next legislative session in 1971, following an unofficial referendum held in this county, the county was returned to the regulatory authority of the commission.

Only the legislature has power to make the change, and it is believed that Sanders and Caperton would give serious consideration to an official referendum from the commission.

It is anticipated that there will be a large number of citizens present for the hearing Dec. 8th both for and against the proposal to remove this county from regulatory control.

resulting in a loss of valuable income to some property owners.

All Of County Or None
Some thought was given to the possibility that only a portion of the county might be removed from the Parks and Wildlife regulatory control program, however Parks and Wildlife officials said that "all or none" of the county must be in or out of the program.

The removal of the county from the P&W regulatory program would have decided effect on other wildlife. Instead of the Parks and Wildlife Dept. setting the dates for the deer season, usually on the Saturday

nearest the 15th of November and closing the Saturday after January 1st, except that the closing date can be no later than Jan. 15th, the county would have to set the general law provision set by the Texas Legislature, calls for the season to open annually on November 15th, regardless of the day of the week.

Under regulatory control, the limit is set by the Parks and Wildlife Department and this year is one buck, which would include a spike buck; and two antlerless deer which may be killed only with a permit obtained by the landowner from the Parks and Wildlife Dept. In two designated areas of the county, under general law, the limit would be two bucks (and a spike would not be considered a legal buck) and no antlerless or doe deer.

Last Friday it was Barbers Hill opening the scoring following a partially blocked punt. The Eagles moved to inside the Waller 10 but had to settle for a 23 yard field goal by Vance Hall.

Waller scored the game's only touchdown in the second quarter with DeWayne Charleston plunging in from one yard out to cap an 88 yard, nine play drive. A pair of 13 by Craig Charleston, 16 by Byron Johnson and a 15 yard pass to Wayne Hill sealed the scoring drive. Bobbie Phillips made it 7 to 3 with the kick.

The Eagles threatened midway through the fourth quarter after a fourth down was called over the Waller punter's head to give Barbers Hill possession on the 25. But the Bulldogs defense held steady 97 yards and allowed led by Edwards.
