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Public Comments Sought On 1981 Rice Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is considering decisions on the 1981 rice program and is asking the public to submit comments before Jan. 5. Ray Fitzgerald, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service reports.

Areas of the program under consideration include: Whether there should be an acreage set-aside, and if so, how large it should be. Whether there should be land diversion payments, and if so, the level of the payment.

Whether to require compliance with the normal crop acreage for program benefit eligibility.

The established price for the 1981 crop and purchase rate for the 1981 crop, including premiums and discounts for different grades and classes of rice, and commodity eligibility and storage requirements.

Fitzgerald said legislation authorizing USDA to conduct a rice acreage set-aside if the total rice supply likely would be excessive. Under this program farmers must set aside an acreage of cropland equal to a specified percentage of their rice acreage allotment to be eligible for government loans, purchases and payments.

The amount of the set-aside cannot exceed 30 percent of the farm allotment. Also, the acreage a farmer plants to designated crops may not be more than the farm's normal crop acreage minus the set-aside.

Without a set-aside or diversion program, 1981 rice production is projected to be about 150 million hundredweight, up about 7 million hundredweight from 1980.

When combined with 1981 carryover of about 26 million hundredweight, total supply could be 176 million hundredweight.

Utilization in 1981 is estimated at about 143 million hundredweight. Allowing for a difference of about 4 million hundredweight, this would leave ending stocks at around 29 million hundredweight, or an increase of about 3 million hundredweight from the beginning stock level.

Whether or not a set-aside is in effect, USDA may make land diversion payments if these payments are necessary to help adjust the total national rice acreage to desirable goals.

The 1981 target price will be based on the 1980 target price, adjusted for changes in the cost-of-production. Based on preliminary data, the 1981 target price could range from \$10.30 to \$11.40 per hundredweight.

The estimated 1981-crop loan and purchase rate, which is tied by a formula to the target price, could range from \$7.70 to \$8.55 per hundredweight. USDA could reduce the 1981 loan and purchase rate to as low as \$6.31 per hundredweight if higher rates would discourage exports and result in a buildup of U.S. stocks.

The final 1981 target price and loan and purchase rate will be announced early next spring.

Another 2,4-D Hearing In County Dec. 8th

Colorado County Commissioners' Court will hold another hearing on possible 2,4-D restrictions in this county at 4:00 p.m. Monday, Dec. 8th. At that time a hearing will be held to consider whether the Commissioners' Court should pass an order removing that portion of the county lying north of Interstate 10 from the regulatory control of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

At the court's meeting on Monday, Nov. 10th, the commissioners adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioner of Agriculture to restrict the use of the 2,4-D herbicide from March 1st through May 1st in that portion of the county south of Highway 90A.

At that meeting, Weimar Commissioner Rafael Veselka asked the court to consider the removal of all regulations on 2,4-D in the area north of Interstate 10 since the use of the herbicide in that area would be unlikely to have any effect on growing crops such as cotton and grain, gardens and other foliage because winds prevail from the south during the period when the herbicide would be most likely to affect the plants, in the early spring of the year.

State F.B. Meeting In San Antonio

Leaders in state and national government and farm organizations will be speakers Monday, Dec. 1, at special conferences held in conjunction with the 47th annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau.

The Young Farmer and Rancher Breakfast will kick off the conference schedule early that morning. At 1 p.m., the other conferences will begin for Energy, Farm Bureau Economic Services, Farm Program, Taxes, Meat Production, and Transportation.

Speaker for the Energy conference is U.S. Congressman Charles Stenholm. He will review the national energy situation.

For the Farm Bureau Economic Services conference, a panel of TFB staff members will discuss the various service-to-member programs - insurance, tires, batteries, and tillage tools, hog marketing, and discount buying of Texas products.

Speaking on the future of the farm program will be W. Glenn Tessey, assistant director of National Affairs for the American Farm Bureau Federation in Washington, D.C.

Several tax experts will speak at the Texas conference on the subject of "Understanding Tax Problems."

More than 1,200 voting delegates from 218 organized county Farm Bureaus are expected to attend the convention which gets under way Sunday, Nov. 30, and concludes Wednesday, Dec. 3.

Delegates will adopt state policies to guide the farm organization when the 47th Texas Legislature convenes in January.

Approved resolutions on national matters will become recommendations for national policy when the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting is held Jan. 11-15 in New Orleans.

CPL Changes Billing On Fuel Adjust.

The separate fuel adjustment item that has been shown on Central Power and Light Company bills since early 1977 will be eliminated beginning next week, but it will not change the price of electricity.

The practice of showing fuel as a separate itemized part of electric bills was established when rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas first became effective. Because of continuing customer confusion over fuel charges the PUC in July of this year modified their rules to make such itemization optional.

According to Bob McInteer, CPL's manager at Eagle Lake, this will not change in any way the methods used to calculate monthly bills, the bills will still recover fuel costs based on the cost of fuel used to generate each customer's electricity. We have always felt that to show fuel as a separate item was confusing and frustrating to many of our customers. This change should streamline bills and make them easier to understand," McInteer further stated. "All bills will continue to show a fuel cost factor to provide information to those customers who want to know or monitor monthly fuel charges."

Rotarians Have Program On Trapping Deer

Royce Jurriss, biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in an eight-county area, was guest speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club on Wednesday of last week and brought an interesting program on trapping deer for relocation and restocking purposes.

Jurriss was introduced by the Rev. Tom Hannus, program chairman for the day. Jurriss showed slide film on the use of nets used in South Texas locations to trap deer, both bucks and does for relocation to areas where the ratio of bucks and does is in improper balance.

Of unusual interest was one program of trapping on a South Texas ranch without a single tree or underbrush and that ranch has yielded numerous deer during the trapping program.

During the question and answer session which followed, the biologist contributed the chemical analysis of the soil as a prime ingredient in the growing of large deer and large horns. He noted that it is doubtful that large deer moved to this area would be productive of large animals due to the lesser amount of protein available from the soil for vegetation and other foods for the growth of deer.

In response to a question about the decreasing deer population in this county, the biologist commented that the ratio of deer per acre remains fairly constant. The big problem, he said, lies in the fact that many, many acres of deer habitat have been lost through development programs, highway expansion and by urban growth.
