[By Cong. J. J. Pickle] Thanksgiving is a time to count our blessings and appreciate the abundance our land and our hard-working farm community provide us.

We certainly should count our blessings. But at this season, we should also remember that millions of people around the world suffer from malnutrition. Fears are being expressed that if our country endures another drought next year like the summer of 1980, world food supplies could reach a critically low threshold.

Avoiding world famine sounds like an almost insurmountable task, but the Congress recently approved legislation which casts a small but steady ray of hope on the situation.

The House completed work and the President has just signed, a bill which establishes an emergency grain reserve. The government will store four million tons of wheat for use when aid for famine or other emergency relief cannot be met through the normal market purchases due to shortages. Up to 300,000 tons of the reserve could be authorized each year, regardless of overall supplies, to meet special unanticipated needs. Such a reserve this year could have speeded aid to areas of East Africa which are already experiencing famine conditions. Nutrition experts and religious leaders have long advocated some kind of government grain reserve. Farmers have been cool to the idea, fearing with some justification that the government could release the grain into the market and drive down prices.

But this year, some unusual circumstances helped bring the idea to fruition. Upon announcing the Russian grain embargo, President Carter ordered the government to buy the grain which had been earmarked to Russia to prevent a domestic grain glut. Eventually, the four million tons would have been released back into the market. So farmers this year did not oppose a government reserve, and the legislation did not bust any budgets since the government has already bought the grain. After year of talk, the agreement was reached and the plan was hatched.
