Congress To Address Vote Return Issue

Among the many surprises which occurred in the last election were defeats of some House members in Western states who had been expected to win. Other tight races were predicted, which also led to the loss of several veteran members. President Carter conceded defeat while the ballot boxes were still open for business on the West Coast. Many people, including some defeated Congressmen, felt that because many potential voters figured the races were already over, they did not bother to vote; thus some close races came out differently. What should we do to make sure computer projections and actual conceptions of defeat do not interfere with the election process? In the wake of November 4th, several House members, including one who narrowly lost, have suggested ways to prevent a similar occurrence in the future. Some people have suggested instructing the television news networks not to broadcast any final returns from one part of the country until the polls from coast to coast have closed. However, I do not think the government should begin the business of playing news director with any journalistic organization. There are such obvious First Amendment problems with this suggestion that I do not believe it will be seriously pursued. Besides, the problem is more a symptom of a dysfunction with the electoral system rather than reporting about that system. Several bills have been introduced to address the problem. One bill would open polls at the same "absolute" time, regardless of the time zone. The polls would close a certain number of hours later. For instance, polls would open in New York at 6 a.m. and open in California at 9 a.m. Another approach would retain current poll times but would seal ballot boxes and machines until all voting across the nation has been completed. Still another Congressman would change the system more dramatically. His bill would introduce a six-year trial period where all general elections would be held on Sunday. Many Western European nations hold elections on Sundays, and turnouts are much higher than in the U.S. I am not yet ready to endorse any specific proposal, but it is hard to say whether a Sunday voting would increase turnout. The
