CPL explores new power sources for long-range needs

Because of the shortage of natural gas—and resulting restrictions on its use by utility firms—Central Power and Light Company is turning to other fuels to generate electricity for its customers in South Texas. For the immediate future, CPL will rely heavily on nuclear and coal-fired plants, drawing more than 40% of its production from these two sources by the late 1980s.

But the company is doing long-range planning, too. In cooperation with research agencies and other utilities, CPL is presently studying several new areas that have the potential to become energy sources many years in the future: gasification of solid or liquid fuels, geothermal steam, solar repowering and nuclear fusion.

At CPL's La Palma Power Station in San Benito, a gasification research project is being conducted on conversion of solid and liquid fuels into a gas that can be burned in place of natural gas in existing boilers. Sustained generation of electricity already has been achieved with gas produced from heavy fuel oil. Other fuels, such as coal and lignite, also will be tested. The experiment will determine whether the gasification process will allow utilities to continue using existing boilers when natural gas is no longer available.

CPL also is participating in a project to examine the possibility of using geothermal energy for production of electricity. The project, which involves wells drilled into geopressured sands along the Texas coast, is being coordinated by the Center for Energy Studies and the Bureau of Economic Geology at the University of Texas at Austin.

As a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, CPL has supported since 1957 nuclear fusion research at the University of Texas. Researchers at the Fusion Research Center in Austin are optimistic that the scientific feasibility of nuclear fusion can be proven by 1982, but it will take another 15 to 20 years to design a reliable fusion power plant.

Besides sharing in these studies, the company also is represented on a Utility Advisory Committee for a Solar Repowering Study on the possible utilization of solar energy to repower an existing gas boiler.

Such a plan can depend on CPL to investigate and develop the alternate power sources necessary to assure continued electric service far into the future.
