When parole services are not parole board should be allowed to contract with

probation officers for parole services. A total of 91% said convicted offenders should financially repay their victims, and 89.4% said repay-

ment should become a condition of the offender's parole if it has not been accomplished by that time. When an offender's probation is revoked and they are sent. to prison before restitution is completed, 81.8% said they should be required to complete payments. A total of 67.5% agree with the use of halfway houses to ease the transition from prison to two out of three (67.4%) of

the respondents said that law enforcement agencies should be permitted to legally use wiretapping. It should be authorized by a member of the Texas Supreme Court or the attorney general, a majority believe. Investigators for the attorney general were chosen by 76% as the appropriate law enforcement agency to use wiretapping. Only 41.8% favored its use of the DPS, 40,3% by the district attorney investigators, 27.1%
