

## CPL explores new power sources for long-range needs

Because of the shortage of natural gas—and resulting restrictions on its use by utility firms-Central Power and Light Company is turning to other fuels to generate electricity for its cus-tomers in South Texas. For the immediate future, CPL will rely heavily on nuclear and coal-fired tested. Sustained generation of electricity already has been achieved with gas produced from heavy fuel oil. CPL also is participating in a project to examine the possibility of using geothermal energy for production of electricity. The project, which involves wells drilled into geopressured sands along AS Texas count is being coordinated by the Center for Energy Studies and the Bureau of Economic Geology at the University of Texas at Austin.

As a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, CPL has supported since the University of Texas. Resear chers at the Fusion Research Center in Austin are optimistic
