He noted that leases made to individuals or businesses in Houston usually result in uncontrolled numbers of hunters, who hunt all day and eventually drive birds from the area (hunting clubs only hunt half of each day). Also Appel pointed out that most of the hunters on these individual leases buy their shells and equipment in Houston and contribute little, if anything, to the economy of the community.


