## YCC Jobs Available

(By Elva Ann Rame) The Youth Conservation Corps (YCC), is a summer employment program for young men and women, who work, learn, and earn together by doing projects that further the development and conservation of the natural resources of the United States. The YCC program is administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture-Forest Service, U. S. Department of the Interior, and State governments.

Some of the main objectives of the YCC program are to increase the person's knowledge of the environment, safety on the job, and human relationships.

To apply for a YCC job, enrollees must meet the following requirements. They must have attained the age of 15 by June 1, but must have not attained 19 by August 31. Proof of age is required. They must be a permanent resident of the U. S. or its territories or possessions. Enrollees must not have participated as a YCC enrollee for more than three weeks in the past. They must have a Social Security number upon arrival at camp.

Participants must have a desire to work outdoors and become involved in the development and maintenance of the Nation's natural resources. They must have no history of serious criminal behavior. They should be able to participate in various work and training projects of the YCC program. They must be able to obtain medical history. And participants should be able to obtain parental or legal guardian consent to enroll in the program. If you are interested in the YCC program, you may pick up an application at the counselors' offices or at the Attwater Prairie Chicken Refuge.

### Rice Consolidated School District Revised Free and Reduced Price Meal Lunch Policy

The Rice Consolidated Independent School District has announced a revised policy for Free and Reduced Price Meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program.

Recently enacted Federal legislation has revised the income eligibility standards and procedures that schools participating in the National School Lunch, Breakfast and Special Milk Programs shall use to determine a child's eligibility for free and reduced-price meals and free milk for the remainder of the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1981. These changes will affect the eligibility of some children for free and reduced price meals and free milk. The new Income Poverty Guidelines also remove the hardship provisions, previously allowed, and place a standard deduction into the new scales.

The family of each child whose eligibility for program benefits is reduced or terminated shall receive written advanced notice of the reduction in benefits at least 10 days prior to the date of the reduction. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child shall be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin. The Building Principal will review applications and determine eligibility. Each school and the office of the superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.
