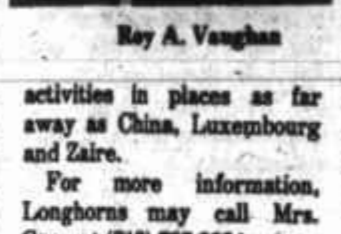

**Foster Parents Desperately Needed in Colorado County**  
 (By Melburn Sibley, Chairman Colorado County Children Services Board)  
 Help a foster child -- be a foster parent! There is an urgent need for approved foster homes in Colorado County. When a crisis situation is discovered it is too late to look for foster parents. The State of Texas has wise and strict requirements for foster homes for the protection of foster children.  
 Who can serve as a foster parent? People who care and have a blend of patience, love and wisdom have the makings of foster parents. Foster parents may be married or single; may have other children or not; must be healthy enough to care for children; must be able to meet their own financial needs; may work outside the home if there is suitable care for the child -- such as after-school care for a school-age child.  
 Foster parents must be willing to work hard and work as part of a team with the Department of Human Resources and others in the community, to meet the foster child's special needs. Foster parents must keep in mind that foster care is temporary and directed toward making the best possible permanent arrangement for the child.  
 Finally, foster parents must be willing to know and understand the individual child, and deal with the child's special situation and needs with patience, determination, skill, and love.  
 "Psychos" Available Also, there are "pay checks" for foster parents. There is free training available to foster parents. The training is provided by experts in the field of child-care and child-development. It can help you not only in dealing more effectively with the foster children placed in your home, but also can help you in dealing more effectively with your own children! It can help you obtain new friends, new skills, and give you the knowledge that you have helped a child who needed your help desperately. Additionally, the foster parent is reimbursed \$7 per day per child aged 0-10 years and \$8 per child aged 10-18 years. The Colorado County Children Services Board helps with school supplies, summer camp, and Christmas gifts. **Hearings Held On Structure Of Social Sec.**  
 (By Camp J. J. Fickel)  
 Last week my Subcommittee on Social Security began a series of hearings on the financial structure of the social security program. Although the situation is manageable, the social security trust funds face some financial problems in the next few years that will only get worse if we ignore them or try to apply band-aid solutions.  
 My subcommittee is very concerned that the new Administration has focused on individual cuts in social security but so far has not applied any visible manpower to coming up with real solutions to the financial problems of the system.  
 A few benefit cuts and some rosy economic predictions will not do the job. My subcommittee has been working on this problem for two years now, and we know that more must be done.  
 The problem is this: In 1972 we tied the social security system to the economy. That strengthened its value for those receiving benefits because so few other programs can keep their benefits in tandem with economic changes. But the projections used to finance the system under this new approach have been far below events that have followed.

**Bill By Caperton To Cut Paperwork Passes The Senate**  
 A bill by Senator Kent Caperton of Bryan designed to eliminate unnecessary government paperwork was the office of the State comptroller was passed unanimously last week in the Texas Senate.  
 The bill, Senate Bill 272, does away with a law requiring the comptroller's office to approve the bonds of county depositories.  
 Another bill authored by Caperton similarly aimed at cutting waste in government passed unanimously in the Senate on Thursday February 12. That bill, Senate Bill 271, expands a 1971 law requiring the comptroller to keep quarterly records received from counties, hospital districts and cities that participate in welfare assistance programs.  
 It is more logical and more efficient to allow the County Commissioners' Office to retain all responsibility for the bonds, Caperton said.  
 Both bills must now go to the Texas House of Representatives for passage before they can become effective.

 \$60,855 in Refund Funds  
 The county has a total of \$60,855 in funds received from the Attwater Prairie Chicken National Wildlife Refuge in lieu of taxes for the 1980-81 period. In the past the checks were divided between the county, the Rice and Columbus school districts on the basis of a ratio of taxes lost by purchase of lands in the refuge located northeast of Eagle Lake. However, this amounts to more than the total taxes lost by the three entities and the question arose as to how and who would get the excess funds.  
 County Auditor M. L. Briscoe was authorized to ask the county attorney to obtain an opinion from the State Attorney General's office as to the division of the funds.  
 The county judge and commissioner feel that the county should be entitled to the excess funds in light of the fact that the county provides roads to the refuge, provides funds for environmental protection (wolf trapping, etc.) and for other services such as emergency ambulance service, fire protection and others.  
 County Judge Cranek estimated that the excess funds could run between \$12,000 and \$15,000 after the three entities received full payment for taxes lost due to the lands being placed into the refuge.  
 The court voted to distribute the funds according to the opinion received or if this takes an excessive time, to make the distribution on the ratio basis until the final ruling on the excess funds is made.  
 In other action by the court, the final contract with the Travis State School for use of the Waldrop Building given to the county as the Waldrop Opportunity Center was approved as amended to provide for a 20-year amortization clause in the contract.  
 Authorized Sheriff George (Doc) Mueller to hire Reinhard (Curly) Wied of Garwood as a special deputy so that he could attend a law enforcement school. Under

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**Commr. Court Upgrades Dist. Clerk's Sec. Position; Divides Refuge Funds**  
 Colorado County Commissioners' Court, in special session Monday, upgraded the position of secretary for District Clerk Harvey Vornsaad to a 4-day, 32-hour per week position; authorized distribution of the Attwater Prairie Chicken Refuge funds received "according to law; and handled other routine matters.  
 District Clerk Vornsaad requested upgrading of his secretary's position from two and one-half days per week to four days, in order that he might be able to hire someone and that person qualify for insurance benefits provided by the county.  
 Mr. Vornsaad's secretary, Susan Rogers, had been employed with the district clerk two and one-half days a week with the juvenile court in this county for two and one-half days. She resigned to accept a position as secretary to County Judge Lester J. Cranek upon his recent resignation of Marijuli Urban.  
 Judge Cranek pointed out that a county employee does not qualify for the insurance benefits unless employed at least 32 hours per week. Vornsaad commented that a secretary in his office would stay busy for 32 hours per week, but might have long periods in a 40 hour week, hence he recommended that the position be approved on a 32-hour per week basis.  
 He cited figures showing the great increase of activity in the district clerk's office. In 1970 165 cases were filed, 247 in 1975 and 356 in 1980. Income in the office from fees was \$4,000 in 1970, \$12,000 in 1975 and \$18,000 in 1980, plus the fact that an additional \$13,000 became available to the county under the new system of bookkeeping in 1980.  
 His request for establishing a 32-hour per week position was approved with pay set at \$4,32 per hour or \$599.20 per week. He said that he was in the process of taking applications for the position.

**91 Pints Of Blood Are Given Here**  
 The people of Eagle Lake united together this past Saturday to make the first Eagle Lake Community Blood Drive a huge success according to "The Eagle Lake Ministerial Alliance, sponsors of the event. Following a bit of difficulty in locating Grace Lutheran Church and thus being a bit late in starting, the Blood Center collected 91 units of blood. In all 107 people volunteered to donate blood, but for various reasons 16 had to be turned back. According to the Blood Center in Houston, most drives of this nature only take in about 25 to 30 units of blood in the six-hour time period. They were very impressed by the community pride and the willingness of the community to share their life with others who are in need.  
 Following the blood drive, the collected blood was taken back to Houston where it is in the process of being tested. Once the tests have been completed, most of the 91 units will be broken down into four parts. Thus while 91 units of blood were given, because of our generosity, the possibility is that 364 people might be helped. And some of these 364 people might even be members of our own community since the Eagle Lake Community Hospital uses the services of the Blood Center in Houston.
