Gas Wells Completed At Garwood, E.L.

Production figures have been reported on two new gas producers in this part of the county, one 5.7 miles north of Garwood and the other 10 miles east of Eagle Lake.

The No. 1 Marsalis east of Eagle Lake was drilled by Realtime Energy Corp. of Houston to 4,712 feet and has production from 3,796 to 3,770 feet. Production is logged at 508,000 cubic feet of gas daily on a 10/64 choke with absolute open flow of 4,400,000 cubic feet per day.

The well is on a 240-acre tract in the GHAH Survey. The driller has asked for a field designation for the well.

The No. 1 Chavis well, north of Garwood, was drilled by Glaser Energy Inc. of Corpus Christi and tested with 1,097,000 cubic feet of gas per day on a 875 choke and absolute open flow of 1,500,000 cubic feet per day.

The well is located in the S. Kennedy Survey and was drilled to 9,274 feet but was plugged back to 3,900 feet and has production from 3,752 to 3,758 feet.

Also in the Garwood area is a well east by Lyndonhook No. 1 Metta Johnson eight miles west-northwest of Garwood with projected depth to 6,500 feet.

County Pays \$14,176 For Sheriff's Cars; \$42,360 For Airport Materials

Precincts 1, 2, 3 To Share Cost Of Paving Columbus Runway

Colorado County Commissioners' Court, in regular session Monday, approved the purchase of two new automobiles for the county sheriff's department at a cost of \$14,176, after trade-in of two used units; and authorized the purchase of 2,500 tons of Type C pre-mix asphalt and rock for topping the runway at the Columbus Airport, just southwest of Columbus.

The court considered three bids for the sheriff's auto and accepted the lowest bid of the three made by Brashear Motor Co. of Waumar. The firm offered two 1981 Impala Chevrolets for \$14,176.00 net with delivery in 4 to 6 weeks. The Impalas will have 305 cubic inch engines with four-barrel carburetors.

Also offering bids were: J. F. Miller Ford, Inc. of Eagle Lake, which offered two 1981 Ford LTDs, with 302 V8 engines, for \$15,448.82, after trade-in; and Don Morrison Ford of Columbus which offered 2 1981 Ford LTDs with 351 cubic inch engines for \$14,925.00 after trade-in.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Jerome Wicks questioned the asking for bids on the two different-size engines, 302 with four-barrel carburetors and 351 with dual-barrel carburetors. Chief Deputy Sheriff Jim Broussard was present and he explained that the 302 engine with four-barrel carburetor was believed by the department to be equivalent to a 351 engine with dual barrel carburetor. Dennis Kubecka, representing Morrison Ford, questioned this opinion.

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Commissioners Precincts 1, 2 and 3 plan to share in the costs of topping the 50-foot wide and 8200-foot long runway at the new Columbus Airport site. The court considered two bids received for the 2,000 tons of pre-mix asphalt needed for the job, and awarded a contract to White Mines of San Antonio for the Type C pre-mix at a cost of \$12.25 per ton plus \$3.82 per ton for freight to a Columbus, Altair or Glidden site.

Commissioners Otto Loessin, Rafael Veselka and Jerome Wicks plan to stand the cost of the asphalt materials and for costs of unloading the material and will provide trucks and drivers to transport the material from whichever site is determined the best for unloading of the 21-25 train carsloads of material.

In considering the asphalt bids, Stiles contended that the job could be done at less cost by using a double cut process. However a representative of White Mines who was present pointed out that using flint rock on the paving would prevent the plane owners from obtaining insurance, because of the damage caused by the flint rock to propellers and other parts of the aircraft.

In the voting on the purchase, Loessin, Veselka and Wicks for. Commissioner Presented the court officially presented a resolution commending former Precinct 3 Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker for twelve years of service to the citizens of Colorado County and the county. The resolution was approved in January but was officially presented by Judge Lester J. Crank in behalf of the court, Monday.

The citation noted that Leyendecker always "deduced" to represent his constituents (precinct three) and over the entire county faithfully and diligently for the past 12 years.

Judge Crank noted also that he had observed that Leyendecker always acted in the best interest of all citizens of the county. He added that the former commissioner was "well respected and well thought of" by commissioners and judges over the entire state.

Leyendecker said that he had enjoyed serving the citizens of Colorado County and added "I learned a lot from all of you."

In other action the court approved applications for use of county road right of way for telephone cables by Southwestern Bell Telephone.

A passed a request from the postal service to name streets in the Barton Addition when it was learned that the streets are not needed to the county.

Approved orders designating First State Bank as the county depository for the next two years; accepted letters from Exxon and Citicorp Service Company accepting liabilities for any damage that might be incurred to roads and bridges with loads in excess of road limits, during well drilling operations in the county;

Approved a request from Commissioner Wicks to grant additional sick leave time to an employee of Precinct 2, Alfred Kutz.

Name Election Judges

The court officially named election judges for any election that might need to be held countywide during the year of 1981, same as in the past, except that it was noted that the judge in Columbus Precinct 18 had died and Tyler T. Clark was named election judge in the North Columbus precinct.

The court authorized an expenditure of \$100 of the \$2,000 allocation made in the budget to the Senior Citizens program in this county for the purchase of plaques and awards for the Older Texas Fair to be held at St. Mary's parish hall in Nada on May 17. The motion passed 50 with Commissioner Stiles abstaining.

County Judge Crank reported that the \$5 bounty was paid on 25 wolf or coyote scalps turned in by private citizens during the month of February. None were turned in by the special trappers who receive \$25 per scalp turned in.

Pre-Construction Meet Here On IH-10 Work

A pre-construction meeting was held at 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday, March 4, at the State Department of Highways office in Columbus to discuss construction plans for a project recently awarded to Southland Construction Company. The Texarkana firm was low bidder at \$78,970.00 for repairing existing concrete pavement on a portion of Interstate Highway 10 in Colorado County.

The twelve-mile project, which extends from 0.6 miles East of Alletton Road (Old P.M. 102) to the Austin County Line, has been allotted 75 working days for completion.

Melvin B. Bayless, resident engineer in charge of construction, said, "Since this section of Interstate 10 was opened about 14 years ago, the auto and truck traffic has increased at a faster rate than anticipated. This, coupled with heavier wheel loads, has been a major factor in the deterioration of the concrete pavement. The proposed work will restore the riding quality of the pavement and extend the useful life of this highway. Traffic flow will be maintained during construction with a

Now's Time To Plant Permanent Grasses

Now is the time to start thinking about planting or sprigging permanent grasses on your farm. Planting dates for most grasses in Colorado County are from February 15 to May 15. One exception to this planting date is coastal bermudagrass, which can be sprigged from January 1 to May 15.

In preparing a proper seedbed for planting or sprigging grasses, a disk harrow, breaking plow, moldboard, or offset disk plow may be used. The seedbed must always be clean, firm, and free from any competing vegetation. Proper preparation of the seedbed definitely means the difference between the success or failure of a grass planting. Think of having the seedbed prepared as if you were going to plant a garden on the area to be planted to grass.

When sprigging coastal bermudagrass, the dormant sprigs should not be planted deeper than two to three inches. The sprigs must be placed in moist soil and be packed with packer wheels at the time of sprigging.

Seed Shallow

In planting seed type grasses, the seeds should not be planted deeper than 1/2 to 3/4 inch. Recommendations for seeding rates for grasses

Local Episcopal Church Joins Fund Raising Efforts

Christ Episcopal Church of Eagle Lake is one of 152 Episcopal churches in 57 counties of southeast and central Texas joining in the largest fund-raising effort ever undertaken in the Episcopal Diocese of Texas. The effort to be spread out over the three months from March 15 to June 15 will be spent on church programs both in Texas and overseas.

The Texas effort is a part of a nationwide fund-raising program which has been going on nationally in the Episcopal Church 1979, the result of which has been the raising of more than \$110,000,000.

The campaign, called "Vestments in Mission," received the enthusiastic approval of the Diocese's official delegates to its annual council in Galveston in early February and an all-out effort reaching every one of the approximately 79,000 Episcopal congregations in the Diocese's geographical area is now underway.

The money will help support missionary work of the national church and the Diocese in Africa, Western Mexico and the West Indies.

It will enable the Diocese to buy new mission sites to accommodate the expected growth of the Episcopal Church in Texas and it will inaugurate new programs of ministry in urban areas and among minorities. A major portion of the funds to be raised will help Episcopalians participate in major conferences on evangelism, Christian education and stewardship. Some of the funds will help support ongoing parish programs in those areas.
