

Miss Mary Jo Spanihel Weds Terry LeNorman In Rites Here

Miss Mary Jo Spanihel and Terry Dean LeNorman were united in marriage at 5 p.m. on February 14, 1981 in Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church. Parents of the couple are Mr. and Mrs. Leon J. Spanihel of Eagle Lake and Mr. and Mrs. Don LeNorman of Riverside.

Most Reverend Warren Boudreaux, D.D., Bishop of Houma-Thibodaux Diocese in Louisiana, witnessed the vows and was principal celebrant of the Nuptial Mass. Father Tom Haas, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, concelebrated the Mass with Bishop Boudreaux. Robert Dierschke and Brian Rucka were altar boys. Shawn Spanihel, brother of the bride, was lector for the Mass.

Mrs. Clarence Martin was organist for the occasion and accompanied Mrs. Joe Mike Spanihel and Mrs. Frank Briscoe, sister-in-law and sister of the bride, when they sang: "The Theme from Ice Castles," "Sweetest Mother," "Blessed Be This Day," and "Ave Maria." Mrs. Edward Sunderman, sister of the bride, sang "Two Candles" as the couple lit their wedding candles from the Spanihel and LeNorman family candles which had been lit by the parents at the beginning of Mass.

Arrangements of peach and brown open silk roses, peach apple blossoms, and rust cattails flanked an arched candelabrum of slender ivory candles, lined with potted-orchids. The bride was draped with a white coverlet, the creation of Mrs. Bill Stiles and the bride's mother, featuring symbols of the Sacrament of Matrimony.

Mary Jo, escorted to the altar by her father, was radiant in a candlelight gown designed by her mother. The bride of a reemblemized Alencon lace featured a

shaped, center panel beaded with seed pearls and full sleeves of accented pleated organza caught in lace, ivory cuffs. 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Texas Supreme Ct. Rule OK's Injunction Against Developers

The Texas Supreme Court in Austin reversed lower court decisions and ruled that two developers have no right to an easement across private property owned by a private couple.

The Supreme Court granted an injunction sought by Hal B. and Ella Allen to prevent Terry Keeling, doing business as A&K Properties, and Everett Anderson, doing business as Mallard Investments, from trespassing on the Allens' land.

The Allens own 480 acres of land in Lavaca County. Keeling and Anderson are developing a residential subdivision on 1,000 acres of land adjacent to the Allen property and had sought an easement across a portion of the Allen property to connect their subdivision with Allen Ranch Road.

A Lavaca County trial court ruled that Keeling and Anderson were entitled to an easement across 18 feet of the road right of way because the area between Allen Ranch Road and the Allen fence line is part of the county easement because it is necessary for the convenience of the traveling public. The civil appeals court upheld that decision but the Supreme Court reversed the judgment and granted an injunction.

The Supreme Court ruled that the Keeling and Anderson tract does not touch the

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County Will Receive \$96,768 Road Refund

An emergency bill co-sponsored by Senator Kent Caperton of Bryan will return \$96,768 in state revenue to Colorado County for local road construction and repairs. The bill, Senate Bill 151, by Senator Ray Farabee, was signed into law on Wednesday, March 11 by Governor William P. Clements, Jr.

"This legislation will help local government and every taxpayer in the state," said Caperton. "It will help the county government hold the line on local tax rates by lifting the costly burden of having to pay for road construction and improvements," he said. "This should have a major impact on the fiscal health of local government."

The bill directs the State Treasurer to distribute the money from the state's county and road district highway fund. Since 1979,

county governments have been severely hurt because no mechanism existed to distribute the funds. This emergency legislation corrects the situation by establishing a formula for the state to follow in making the disbursement. It will enable rural counties to purchase expensive road equipment and maintain the county's farm-to-market and lateral roads.

The state will disburse the \$96,768 to Colorado County in October of this year. Austin County will receive \$92,712 and Wharton County \$149,100.
