Q: I've heard that the elderly are entitled to a tax freeze. Is this true?

A: Resident homeowners who are 65 or older are entitled to a freeze on the amount of their school taxes. If you qualify for the over-65

Q: How do I apply for my exemption?

A: Exemption applications must be filed with each local tax office on an annual basis. To insure that you do not lose any tax relief to which you may be entitled, it is to your advantage to file before the local rendition period ends on April 1 or April 30. While you may be able to file later under recent Attorney General's opinion, the burden and expense of proving an equitable reason for the application being late will fall on you, the taxpayer.

Q: I own agricultural land. Can it be taxed on its productivity rather than on its higher market value?

A: Two amendments to the Texas Constitution permit agricultural and open-space land to be taxed generally at its productivity value instead of market value. These provisions are effective only if applications are filed with the tax office in a timely manner (during the rendition period). Your local assessor can provide information on the legal qualifications for agricultural or open-space designation.

Q: What effect does the new Property Tax Code have on the way property taxation

district, which becomes fully operational in 1982, will be responsible for conducting property appraisals and providing values to each taxing jurisdiction in the county. This means that each taxing jurisdiction which levies taxes on your property will use the same value on it. Your local elected officials, however, will continue to set the tax rate, just as in the past.

Q: Where can I turn for additional information on my property taxes?

A: You may contact your local tax assessors or, if you are a resident of one of approximately 30 counties which implemented their countywide appraisal districts in 1981 under local intergovernmental contract, you may also contact the district's chief appraiser. All tax offices have copies of a State Property Tax Board pamphlet titled "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities" which contains information about the property tax system and gives advice on how to appeal the values placed on your property.

If the tax office has run out of pamphlets, you may obtain a single copy free by writing the State Property Tax Board, P.O. Box 15900, Austin, Texas 78761.

Patrolman Reed Assaulted In Making Arrest

An Eagle Lake man is charged with assault on an officer after he resisted arrest on a traffic violation early Sunday morning.

City Patrolman Jack Reed stopped a car driven by David Rodriguez of Eagle Lake on a traffic violation. The officer said that Rodriguez became extremely belligerent and refused to sign the ticket. The officer attempted to handcuff Rodriguez when he refused to sign the ticket, but Rodriguez resisted and a scuffle resulted in the officer was applying the handcuffs and Rodriguez attempted to reach into a pant's pocket for a knife. He was unable to do so and he was handcuffed and brought to the police station.

He was arraigned before Justice of the Peace M. M. Jones for alleged assault on an officer and bond was set at \$3,000 and Rodriguez was transferred to the county jail.

The case will go before the next grand jury to be in session next month.

A knife was recovered from the pant's pocket of Rodriguez's coveralls and a club was found under the seat of his car, according to the officer.

Officer Reed spent several days this week in the hospital with a pinched nerve believed aggravated by the incident.

Commr. Court OK's Med. Ins. For Employees

Colorado County Commissioners' Court met for a short session Monday and approved a contract with the Texas Association of Counties medical health insurance program underwritten by Prudential Life Insurance Co. to provide medical insurance and life insurance coverage to county officials and employees.

The court considered three plans offered by the Texas Assn. of Counties in comparison with one offered by the current carrier, Blue Cross-Blue Shield, and another plan offered by Empire Benefit Claims Insurance Co. The plan finally adopted by the court was one called Plan B or the (Mid) plan offered by Prudential. The coverage is virtually the same as that previously offered by Blue Cross-Blue Shield. Coverage will be 80% of the cost of medical costs and 100% coverage with a \$100 annual deductible.

Cost of the coverage will be \$41.45 per month for the employee only; additional \$26.80 per month for an employee with child or children; \$44.24 for employee's spouse; or \$71.14 per month for spouse and children. This compares with the new rates offered by B.C.B.S. of \$41.78 for the employee; \$59.32 for child or children; \$67.06 for spouse only; and \$77.81 for spouse and children.

The TAC's life insurance program was also accepted and will provide coverage equal to the employee's annual salary, adjusted to the lower full \$1,000 level.

The county pays for the cost of the medical insurance and life insurance programs for employees, but the employee pays for coverage for children and spouses.

Architect's Payment OK'd

The court on a 2-1 vote, approved a payment of \$10,000 to Arthur J. Wilcox, architect for the project courthouse restoration program. His total contract called for payment of \$67,000 and all but \$23,000 has been paid. The payment Monday reduced the balance due to Wilcox upon successful completion of the project to \$11,000. President & Commissioner Bill Miles voted against making the payment to Wilcox.

Also on the agenda, the court approved telephone applications to lay cable in county road right of way; and tabled a request to consider George P. Fisher for a Special Will Trustee since Prudential, in whose Policies meeting, was absent from the meeting.
