Local Man Charged In Arson Attempt

A serious fire was narrowly averted on Thursday last week when an apparent attempt to set fire to Stevenson's Cafe on the Bothe Drive (Highway 90A by-pass) was thwarted by alert citizens in the cafe.

Eagle Lake police were called to the cafe when the attempted arson was allegedly made by Joe Allen Davidson of Eagle Lake.

The report showed that Davidson had been in the cafe earlier Thursday to purchase food and did not have money to pay for the order so he was ordered to leave and never came back.

Officers learned that he went across the street to the Thriftymen Service Station where he purchased 81c worth of gasoline and apparently returned to the cafe and used the gasoline and rags and paper in an attempt to torch the building.

A person in the cafe saw Davidson and became suspicious and this and the fact that another person in the cafe had a fire extinguisher in his car, resulted in the fire being extinguished before the wooden frame building could become ignited. The side of the building was scorched and Eagle Lake fire department sent a truck to the scene to wash away the gasoline.

Officers found a can with the odor of gasoline near the scene and Davidson was identified as the one purchasing gasoline at Thriftymen's and he was arrested on McCarty Ave. by Officers Jack Reed and Bill Chavis and arranged before Justice of the Peace M. M. Jones on a charge of arson and bond was set at \$5,000 and he was transferred to the Colorado County Jail to await action by the next grand jury.

Chief of Police Earl Wintermann noted that the situation could have gotten serious if circumstances had not been just right, since the building could have ignited quickly and there were a lot of people in the building at the time.
