"OVER MY SHOULDER"

March's market was unsettled, though prices strained to improve late in the month. A few cold fronts moved through South, Central and East Texas and triggered showers, but in some areas moisture continued to remain short.

Glimpses of Spring with its warm days encouraged the grass to grow yet past dry conditions slowed the green coming on.

As the month ended stocker-feeders were climbing out of the dumps and were slightly improving. In general, lightweight steers, 300 to 400 pounds were \$75 to \$85, shorter ones dropped to \$60 to \$65, the 400 to 500 pound steers were \$65 to \$75 with heifer calves \$62 to \$67, short coupled heifers \$55 to \$61.

In late March the release of two USDA reports tried their best to boost feed slaughter cattle out of their rut.

The Cattle on Feed report of the 7 major feeding states told of numbers down 4 percent compared to last year. This was the lowest March number on feed since 1975. The Hog Inventory told of 9 percent fewer "pigs". Even though optimism was radiating from the reports feed steers in Texas panhandle still seemed the month at a weak \$62.50.

Continued large supplies of market ready feed cattle plus pipelines in the industry filled with red meat and poultry took the edge off of an advancement feed cattle wanted to make.

Hog prices could muster no sustained weekly price rise in March but did finish the month on an upward mood. The Hog Inventory was its figures of fewer hogs, 8 percent less market hogs and breeding swine down 11 percent, compared to a year ago, was welcome news to the industry.

Central, South and East Texas grain fed top hogs were \$30 to \$41 at month's end.

County Agent's NOTEBOOK

Weed Control Is Needed In Gardens

Weeds are a problem in backyard gardens just as they are in large fields of vegetables, grain sorghum or cotton. They compete with your desirable plants for water, soil nutrients, sunlight and air. In some cases, they may harbor many different kinds of insects as well as diseases.

What can you do about weeds in your garden? Believe it or not, hand hoeing is probably still the best answer. It is inexpensive, quite selective, accurate, effective, and, for some, even enjoyable. Some local gardeners feel a great deal of emotional satisfaction from weeding on a hoe handle and viewing a clean row where weeds stood only minutes before. Remember, weeds should be relatively small when hoed or pulled from your garden since damage may occur to vegetables if weeds are allowed to get too big before being removed.

Another effective method of controlling garden weeds is to use a mulch. Mulching is one of the real keys to a successful garden in this part of Texas. A mulch is simply defined as "any material spread on garden soil to protect plant roots from heat, cold or drought, reduce problem weeds and keep fruit clean." A mulch controls weeds by keeping light away from seedlings and by providing a mechanical barrier to their emergence. Mulches work best against weeds and grass that come up from seed each year. Any weeds that do come through the mulch can be spotted easily and removed from the garden.

A third method which I feel has limited value for garden weed control is herbicides. While such chemicals work well in single crop situations, it's difficult to use them in a garden where a wide assortment of vegetables may occupy a fairly small space. Personally I feel that herbicides are difficult to use in most garden situations and should not be used by the average home gardener in Colorado County.

However, if you are determined to use chemicals for garden weed control, remember that some herbicides may work with some crops but may damage others. Be sure to follow the exact application rate and use only the correct amount. If you have a relatively large garden, it's possible to use herbicides satisfactorily by grouping vegetables for their tolerance to certain chemicals and diligently following all labels precautions. However, your best bet for satisfactory weed control is to sharpen your trusty hoe and to practice the age-old and time-tested art of mulching.

Expert Shopper Quiz Sharpens Expertness

"Expert shopping" skills don't come naturally. They take practice using an entire variety of consumer tactics. Here's a short quiz to help sharpen your "expertness" in the market place:

1. An "expert shopper" is one who takes advantage of every bargain available. FALSE: Learn to shop around, even "at home," by keeping an eye on ads, knowing where certain sales occur and planning in advance. A bargain is not one if you don't need the item or ever use it.

2. To encourage you to come in to shop, a store advertises a "Sale." TRUE: Watch for genuine sales and specials. Not everything advertised is at a better price than it will be tomorrow. Play detective and hunt the real bargain. Stock up on things you need when prices are seasonally reduced, such as inventory-clearance sales.

3. The bargain term "formerly" (used in front of an older price) means the

S.S. Committee Facing Three Major Issues

[By Cong. J. J. Pickle]

Last week I presented to my subcommittee on social security a comprehensive package of proposals to address problems in this great, social program. The package is not a bill, or even "my" bill, but it is something that the subcommittee is now using to "try" to reach decisions in the near future.

We have three major issues which we must face. First, although social security is one of President Reagan's "safety net" programs, he has proposed some \$2.5 billion in reductions in social security for fiscal 1982, amounting to over \$20 billion in reduction between now

and 1986. The subcommittee must address these requests, trying to be cooperative with the President's overall economic goals while also trying not to harm beneficiaries. Second, and even more important, because of the very high inflation and low wage growth of the last few years, the large retirement fund faces financial difficulties over the new few years. So far, we have not had recommendations from the Administration on how to meet this problem. The subcommittee is proceeding on its own for now, but we hope those recommendations will be coming soon, and that they will present full answers to the problems. Knowledgeable people, from HHS Secretary Richard Schweiker to representatives of retirement groups, have urged the subcommittee to take a pessimistic view of the social security problem over projections we have had earlier. It is our hope that the President will take the advice of so many people vitally concerned about this program and send up proposals which will guarantee social security funding even if his economic program does not perform as well as he expects.

Third, many members of my subcommittee feel that we cannot restore confidence in social security unless we address the long term financial issues in the program—those that occur in the next century—at the same time that we are meeting the program's short-term needs.
