Rotary Program On Life Flight Services

Eagle Lake Rotarians and guests had an informative film on the very successful operation of the Life Flight emergency assistance program offered by Hermann Hospital of Houston at their meeting last week.

Wayne Shifflett was program chairman for the day. He introduced Marguerite Badger, director of the Life Flight program; head flight nurse Cathy Hamill and helicopter pilot Harold Tucker who brought information on the Life Flight program

which has grown from a single helicopter to three helicopters and a Life Flight LD (Long Distance) Lear Jet. Ms. Badger told the group that Life Flight is a 24-hour service that is an airborne extension of Hermann Hospital's Emergency Center.

Through this Category I-rated emergency center, Hermann offers one of the largest and best equipped medical facilities in the area, plus a team of physicians in all medical specialties, said the Life Flight director.

She noted that since 1976, Life Flight helicopters have been taking this capability directly to accident sites, disaster areas, and other locations in the service area (within 130 miles of Houston) that can provide a suitable landing site. She added that Hermann Hospital is one of the few such programs over the United States that flies a physician and nurse aboard every flight.

The director pointed out that from the central location at Hermann, any of the Life Flight helicopters can respond to calls within five minutes and in less than 15 minutes can reach most locations in Harris County. Each helicopter carries a complete line of life-support equipment.

Time Element Critical
"Time is often a crucial factor and a few minutes delay often means the difference between life and death," said Ms. Badger. "Unfortunately, crowded freeways and congested streets have slowed ground transportation."

In 1979 a fixed wing aircraft to accommodate long distance service was inaugurated by Life Flight. The director noted that Life Flight will accept calls only from law enforcement agencies, fire departments, emergency ambulance ser-

• David Wintermann came by the Headlight office Tuesday afternoon to explain the appearance of three helicopters in the area early Tuesday morning. The story goes like this:

At 5:30 a.m. Tuesday a Life Flight helicopter from Hermann Hospital developed fuel problems en route to La Grange and was forced to land on the helipad at the Eagle Lake Community Hospital. Another helicopter from Hermann Hospital was summoned to pick up the doctor and nurses from the first copter and arrived here about 7 a.m. and took them on to La Grange. The first helicopter was taken to the Lakeside Irrigation Co. helipad near the lake plant so that the second copter could land at the hospital. In the meantime another helicopter arrived with a mechanic to repair the fuel problem about 8:15 a.m.

Senate Bill 322, by Caperton and Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, establishes a formula by which benefit increases would be calculated and disbursed to those in the Teacher Retirement System of Texas. The formula is weighted in favor of the earliest retirees currently in the system. It increases the benefits by 21 percent for those who retired before Sept. 1, 1963; 16 percent for retirees in the subsequent period up to May 31, 1971; 14 percent for retirees in the subsequent period up to May 31, 1977; and 2 percent for those who retired in the subsequent period up to August 31, 1979.

Teacher Retirement Increases Win OK In Senate

A bill to increase the monthly retirement benefits for retired teachers through out the state, that would provide greater increases for older retirees on a graduated basis, won the unanimous approval of the Texas Senate on Tuesday, Mar. 1.

The teacher retirement measure, co-sponsored by Senator Kent Caperton of Bryan, addresses a problem that Caperton had focused on in his election campaign.

There is a very critical need, said Caperton, "for the relief provided in this bill particularly among our older
