acquiring property and for developing housing. Lang pointed out that much of the labor force in the community comes from the minority groups and housing is urgently needed for this work force.

Mark Anderson urged the foundation to be selective in its dealings with industry. Wagoner added that the chamber needs to develop a plan of action.

the only property being claimed for a Residential Homestead Exemption for 1981.

Also an additional exemption will be allowed to persons who were 65 years of age or older on January 1, 1981 if they were disabled on January 1, 1981. Under Texas law you may file for either the over 65 exemption or the disability exemption, but not both.

Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to a partial exemption from property taxes. This exemption can be applied to any property - not just a homestead - that is owned on Jan. 1st, 1981.

Two amendments to the Texas Constitution permit agricultural and open-space

land to be taxed generally at its productivity value instead of market value. These provisions are effective only if applications are filed with the tax office in a timely manner.

To qualify for agricultural land qualifications, the land must be currently devoted principally to agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area.

The State Property Tax Board reminds that exemptions are not effective automatically. Applications must be filed each year on or before the April 30th deadline.

The tax board also notes that if you qualify for the 65 or over exemption, your school district tax bill cannot increase as long as you apply for the exemption each year.

described period of time a "stronger" letter is written, however, "no threats are made."

"If the first two steps don't work," said Watts, "then we get down to the point and let them know that unless payment is made within 30 days court action will be taken. It's not our intent to prosecute anyone," he added, "we're just trying to collect what belongs to your city."

Watts indicated that his firm, which currently is working with Colorado County, Weimar and East Bernard High Schools and the city of Hallettsville, does extensive research before entering a court battle.

"We do the title work on the property, talking to anyone that might have an interest in the property," he said. "Then we go to court, the judge rules, and usually we win. Then the tax sale follows."

In Tax Collection Business The Gates Steen law firm has seven lawyers working for it and it is strictly in the tax collection business, according to Watts. "It's all we do," he said. "We're hard workers and we won't get them all but we'll get most of them."

Watts said that the motto of the firm is "If they are able to pay and aren't, they're depriving other people and making them pay more." He

Community Hospital and shortly afterward was transferred to the Herman Hospital in Houston by Life Flight helicopter. He was reported in stable but guarded condition upon leaving Eagle Lake hospital.

Flee From Scene

Carpenter left the scene immediately once the fight stopped. Officers were not sure whether he left in a pickup truck assigned to him by the exploration company or in his car. The pickup was located shortly afterward at a local trailer park and an all-points bulletin was put out to be on the lookout for a 1972 maroon Monte Carlo, with Alabama license plates, owned by the fugitive. Eagle Lake Police Dept. Sergeant Lope Villarreal joined in the investigation.

Some time after the cutting, Chief Winesbrenner received the statement that Teri Dobson had been involved in slashing the tires and she was arrested at around 9:30 p.m. Thursday and arraigned before Judge of the Peace M. J. Jones on the charge of criminal mischief and transferred to the Colorado County jail in lieu of \$2,000 bond.

A warrant was issued by Judge Jones for the arrest of Carpenter on the charge of aggravated assault. He called Chief Winesbrenner at around noon Monday saying that he wanted to give himself up. He came to the "police department at around 1 p.m. He told the officer that he spent Thursday night in some woods and other nights in Victoria and Port Lavaca before deciding to turn himself in.

Carpenter was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Jones on the charge of aggravated assault and bond was set at \$3,000. He was transferred to the Colorado County jail where he was released later Monday in lieu of \$3,000 bond.

near the intersection and went into a skid and the tractor portion of the truck struck the side of a trailer on a truck driven east on Highway 90A by El Campo. This truck was owned by Zehner Bros. of Nada.

One Hospitalized

At 12:47 p.m. Saturday, during a light rain, a 1974 Peterbilt truck and trailer was being driven west on 90A when the truck went out of control on the slick pavement, jackknifed, and crossed the centerline and struck a pickup truck being driven east on 90A almost head-on. Driver of the pickup truck was Jessie Clarence Williams of Houston and the vehicle was owned by Butler Drilling Co. of Houston.

The 1974 Peterbilt gravel truck, owned by Sprint Gravel Co., was being driven west by Basilio Gomez Rodriguez of Eagle Lake. The vehicles met in the eastbound lane and the truck careened into a ditch on the eastbound side of the road and the pickup remained on the shoulder of the roadway. Williams was rescued from the smashed pickup truck by passerby and was taken to the hospital here by the Eagle Lake Ambulance Corps. The entire front of the pickup was demolished. Considerable damage resulted to

the gravel truck and trailer. Both units involved were moved after the investigation by Mike's Auto Parts wreckers.

Patrolman Munsell was still investigating the accident and no charges had been filed late Tuesday. Considering the damaged condition of the pickup, it was felt that Williams was fortunate to escape with a broken arm and severe cuts and bruises.

One-Track Accident Follows The first accident occurred about a half of a mile west of Eagle Lake, near the Jim Clippen home. The second of the two accidents Saturday afternoon occurred at 2:30 p.m. a mile west of Eagle Lake when a 1977 GMC truck and flatbed trailer went out of control on slick highway pavement. The truck was being driven eastbound by Harry Donell Higgins of Brenham, when it went out of control and went into a skid, jackknifed and crossed the highway and went into the ditch on the westbound side of the highway. Fortunately there was no oncoming traffic at the time this truck jackknifed.

Some damage was reported to the truck and a road sign was damaged, but the driver escaped injury, according to investigating officer Munsell.

Committee Reports Heard At Luncheon Meeting Monday

The Eagle Lake Chamber of Commerce members, officers and directors met Monday for a luncheon meeting at Broecker's and made plans for the program of work for the 1981 year and especially for the forthcoming Fourth of July celebration to be held on Saturday, July 4th.

President T. J. Smith presided at the meeting and expressed pleasure at the increase in attendance at the luncheon meeting. Members voted to hold another luncheon meeting (open to the public on a Dutch treat basis) for the next meeting on Monday, May 18th. The meeting will be held at Broecker's and all members and others interested in the betterment of the community are urged to attend.

The chamber is seeking a volunteer for the general chairmanship of the Fourth of July celebration since the task had fallen to Ralph Truly for the past two years and his plans call for him to be out of town on that date this year.

It was decided that tickets to the Chicken Barbecue dinner will go on sale soon with all chamber members and at most business places for \$3.50 per plate. The dinners will be served at the picnic grounds of the Eagle Lake Recreation Center or there will be a fast curb service line. Tickets for the event must be obtained in advance. Reservations will be made for sale of tickets at the picnic grounds on July 4th.

Admission To Dance

The chamber members Monday also made plans for the food and concession booths to be a part of the Independence Day observance and also for the dance to follow. The general committee was authorized to proceed with plans for charging a nominal fee for admission to the dance. In past years, admission to the dance was free.

The committee was authorized to hire two special deputies for duty during the night to assist in crowd control.

Committee Reports

A report was heard from membership and attendance chairman, Mrs. Maxine Griffith, who reported that contacts are being made to increase the membership at least 10% over the 1980 total - a goal set by President Smith upon taking office last January.

William H. Harrison, chairman of the industrial and agricultural development committee, reported on the first annual meeting of the Eagle Lake Industrial Foundation, Inc., as reported in another story in this issue.

In the report on housing, it was noted that J&L Properties, owned by Jim Allen and Roy Dean Van Nort, have completed renovating the educational rooms of the former Methodist Church into eight apartments and all have been filled. Van Nort told the group that they plan to add at least four more apartments in the area at a future date. Progress was also noted on the 12-unit apartment project being constructed by Jim Faulk of Houston on Austin Road between the Kevin Court Apartments and Eagle Lake Community Hospital.

Plans are for the units to be partially powered with solar power. Also Trendmark Developers of Houston have indicated that they will build 36 new homes in the area between Eagle Lake Recreation Center and the hospital and Kevin Courts.

Van Nort said that an effort continues by the city council to obtain a stop light at the intersection of Highway 90A (East Main) and FM 165 (Lakewood Drive) near the Hotel Studies.

Work is continuing to fill "potholes" in city streets and to make improvements at the airport including paving of a turn-around and taxi area.

Columbus Man Charged With Extortion Tues. After Bomb Threats

Investigation In Death Of Columbus Publisher Reopened

The 24-year-old manager of the Sonic Drive-In in Columbus was arrested Tuesday afternoon and charged with extortion after attempts to get money from the Colorado County Citizen newspaper, Colorado County Federal Savings and Loan Association and possibly other places and individuals; and an investigation into the sudden death of the Citizen's editor and publisher Jim Belcher, 44, has been reopened.

Justice of the Peace Richard Schmidt of Columbus held an inquest when Belcher was found dead at his apartment Monday morning.

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
