The program last week was a stirring discussion of Rotary's Four-Way Test by the Rev. Chester L. Sussman of Calvary Baptist Church in Bay City, The Rev. Melburn Sibley was program chairman and introduced the guest speaker.

The speaker urged the Rotarians to observe the Four-Way Test in "life service and not just in lip service."

He admitted that the principle of the test, in the things we think, say or do: "Is it the Truth? Is it Fair to all concerned? Will it build Good Will and Better Friendship? Will it be Beneficial to all concerned?" are hard to live by.

The Rev. Mr. Sussman noted three ways in which help can be obtained in living by these principles. The first of these, he noted, is by prayer, "asking the Lord to help you." He urged that each person select a "set of Soldiers" (principles of the test) in conversation. He stated "Is it the truth? If not then may I keep my mouth shut."

He suggested that fourth and sixth principles might be added to the test. "Is it motivated by love?" and "Is it really necessary?"

Another help in observing the principles of the test, included "Be on guard, be careful, put a muzzle on your mouth" and "be careful what you speak."

His address was well accepted and provided food for thought by fellow Rotarians and guests.

Five Raiders Qualify For Boys Reg. Track Meet

Barrios, Davis, Long, Pennell And Rhodes To Represent Rice

Rice High School will be sending five members of its boys' track team to the Region III Class AAA track meet in Brenham this Saturday, despite a fifth place finish in the team standings of the rain-delayed District 22AAA meet last weekend.

Robert Barrios in the pole vault, Vic Davis in the long jump and Tony Long in the mile, all won first places in their events at qualify for Regional. Picking up second places and also qualifying for the region meet were Jeff Pennell in the high jump and James Rhodes in the shot put.

The Region III meet will get underway on Friday of this week with the pole vault, mile and 1600 meter races with all field events (12:00) and running events (2:30) starting on Saturday.

Belville won the team title of the district meet earning 104 points followed by Waller 101, Columbus 94, Sealy 74th, Rice 59, East Bernard, Hempstead and Brazos.

Despite finishing fifth among eight teams, Raider track coach Finest Axel was

surprisingly pleased with the results. Heading the list of surprises was a newcomer to the varsity competition, freshman Tony Long.

However, because of a two day delay in running the meet because of the devastating storm that passed through the area, Barrios was able to reap enough to compete. Though he did compete in the pole vault, he had to drop out of the 800 meter run, the sprint relay and the 1600 meter relay.

Victor Davis, who along with Barrios won first places in regional to qualify for the state meet last year, defended his district title in the long jump with an effort of 22'5". Davis, too, could be listed as somewhat of a surprise as he had been hampered with a knee injury through most of the season.

But he overcame that problem two weeks ago at a meet in Brookhaven and was able to regain his long jump title.

The other two regional qualifiers, Jeff Pennell in the high jump and James Rhodes in the shot put, both second place finishers, were going on the case for Coach Axel.

"They both have had the potential to be among the top all season long," said the Raider coach. "They did a good job in the district meet but I feel that they both can improve on their marks in the regional."

Other winners competing in the District 22AAA track meet for Rice were: Calvin Foster third in the shot put (44'9"); Danny Morales sixth in the two mile run (11:29); and Michael Place fifth in the 110 high hurdles (15.83).
