Justice of the Peace Richard Schmidt of Columbus, J.P. Precinct One, held an inquest at the scene and ruled death was from an apparent heart failure, believed to have occurred at around midnight Sunday.

Belcher and his brother, Tom Belcher, purchased the Colorado County Citizen on January 1, 1969 from Truman and Elizabeth McElhannon and Jim assumed the position of editor and publisher and has held that position since.

He was active in the Columbus Chamber of Commerce, Columbus Rotary Club and the Columbus Airport Foundation. He owned a private plane and flying was his chief hobby. This brought about his role as a member and officer of the Airport Foundation.

Under his guidance, the Citizen has won many outstanding awards including Conservation Paper of the Year, Texas Press Association awards and others.

Jim Belcher was born June 22, 1936 in Guyton, Okla. He was the son of Roscoe (Bob) and Geraldine Suits Belcher. He graduated from University of Oklahoma and after working for several papers in Oklahoma, became associated with United Press International in several reporting roles before being named to U.P.'s Washington Bureau.
