agencies of the USDA that would help to restore their economy and the general welfare of Colorado County citizens."

The committee recommended that these programs of assistance be made available:

ASCS assistance through the 1981 farm program with disaster provisions for the crops destroyed or damaged.

FMHA low-interest farm loans for affected producers.

CES Agency evaluation of damaged crops and recommended follow-up operations to revive crops or replanting if necessary.

SCS agency technical assistance where needed to rebuild stock ponds, diversion terraces and erosion problems.

The report submitted by the committee as the result of had, high winds, tornadoes included a 20% loss to the 50,000 acres of rice planted in the county; 30% loss to the 14,000 acres of corn; 30% loss to the 10,000 acres of cotton; 20% loss to the 10,000 acres of sorghum; and 2% loss to the 125,000 acres of permanent pasture.

Other damage reported included: 30 barns destroyed, 50 others with major damage; 50 with minor damage; 8 trailer homes destroyed, 8 with major damage and 10 with minor damage; 25 equipment and storage sheds destroyed; 40 with major damage and 80 with minor damage.

It is estimated that a total of 30,000 acres of croplands had damage and other damage to household goods, hay, feed and farm supplies was valued at \$1,500,000. The report estimated that 90 emergency loans would be needed.

as chief of police in Merkel, Texas. Soon afterward he returned to this county to fill the position of Chief Deputy Sheriff and has held that position for the past six years.

Judge Crank noted that Broussard continued his education in law enforcement while in the service, taking courses in conjunction with the University of Alabama.

"When Mr. Broussard joined law enforcement in Texas he was eligible to become certified under the 'grandfather' clause (with ample previous experience), but instead he attended a school to become certified and to increase his professional training," added Judge Crank. "This speaks well for his desire to have the highest possible training in the latest methods of law enforcement."

Immediately following the unanimous vote of the commissioners to appoint Broussard to the sheriff's position, Judge Crank administered the oath of office at which time the new sheriff officially began duties as chief law enforcement officer in this county.

The three chiefs of police in this county were present to support the appointment of Mr. Broussard, including Eagle Lake Chief of Police Earl Winebrenner, Weimar Chief of Police Ken Hollan and Columbus Chief of Police Tom Wine. Chief Wine was however called to official duties just prior to the Thursday, May 21st.

Bid openings were also scheduled for a vibrator plate packer and an insecticide fog generator, but no written bids were submitted so the deadline to enter bids was extended.

Speed Survey On 3013

The council also heard a report during their regular session on Tuesday night of a speed survey on FM 3013 between 90A and State Street. The city requested the survey by the Texas Highway Dept. since no speed limit for that area is posted and speeds there have been reported as excessive.

The suggested speed limit by the highway dept. did not meet with the council's approval so an effort to lower the suggested limit will be made.

Dog Tickets Being Issued

Chief of Police Earl Winebrenner reported to the council on Tuesday night that increased enforcement of the city's dog leash law ordinance was underway. Several tickets had been issued during the previous week, according to the Chief, and stepped-up enforcement is planned. The city reminds citizens that dogs running loose on city streets are subject to being impounded or a ticket and fine may be issued to the dog owners.

One-Way Street

A brief discussion on the possibility of turning Commerce Street into a one-way street was heard at Tuesday night's meeting, since an increasing amount of traffic congestion along that area is causing concern. The council is planning to discuss the issue at its next meeting and is encouraging input from local citizens on the matter.

Fees Discussed

The council reviewed a schedule of fees presented by City Manager Bob Klockman that are charged by the city along with some recommended changes in the schedule. Some of the fees discussed included follow-ups on parking tickets issued in the city, dog pound fee, clean-up truck charges, utility tap charges, etc. Action on the fees is expected at council's next meeting on May 26th.

Other Action

In other action on Tuesday night the council:

- Approved a resolution encouraging the work of the Eagle Lake Industrial Foundation.
- Appointed Lonnie Sommerlatte, J. T. (Tommy) Fillingim and L. J. (Sonny) Spaniel to the Board of Equalization.
- And the council also heard a report on the Allen Street right-of-way near the airport and an alley that runs behind the city's service center on Davis Street. In both cases the council agreed to sell the property only if several stipulations were met.

that her husband had threatened to kill her and when they returned home from an outing in Alton, he placed a loaded .25 automatic pistol on a table near their bed when he retired. She said that she picked the gun off the table and shot at him four times. X-rays showed that two bullets lodged in Bryant's head and two other bullets were recovered from the pillow his head was lying on at the time of the shooting.

Doc Bryant was treated at the Columbus Hospital and then transferred by Life Flight to the Hermann Hospital in Houston where he died at 9:30 a.m. Sunday, May 10th.

Dorothy Bryant, 31, was charged after the shooting with attempted murder and was released on a \$1000 bond set by Justice of the Peace Richard Schmidt of Columbus. However, after hearing of Bryant's death, Sheriff Jim Broussard filed murder charges against the woman and she was arrested on that charge by the sheriff and remains in county jail in lieu of the \$5,000 bond set on this charge by J.P. Schmidt.

Doc Bryant was said to be 45 years of age and was from the Glidden area.

The case is expected to be brought before the next grand jury in Colorado County.

The 1981 Colorado County Older Texans Fair staged by the Colorado County Extension Service was held at St. Mary's Parish Hall in Nada last Thursday and was one of the best-attended Fairs ever held. An informative program was presented and awards were made to the Outstanding Older Texans in this county for 1981 and also for exhibits shown during the Fair.

Herman Wehner of Columbus, chairman of the Older Texans Committee, welcomed all to the event and extended thanks to those who helped in staging the event. Included in the thanks were members of the Older Texans Committee, the Rev. Msgr. Victor Schmidt and members of St. Mary's for use of the hall, the women's organizations of St. Mary's for providing the lunch, to all program participants, for support by the Commissioners' Court, news media and assistance of the eighth grade boys at St. Mary's in preparing for the Fair.

He also praised the county's extension agents, especially Donella Pantel, who provided guidance and leadership in staging the Fair.

Older Texans' Services

Colorado County Judge Lester J. Cranek was due to have appeared on the program to discuss services available to Older Texans in this county, but unfortunately he was called to Austin to support legislation which was of importance to this county. assistance program available through the Colorado County Golden Age Center.

Monsignor Schmidtinsky offered prayers to open the program, one in keeping with the National Prayer Day set by President Reagan and the other a prayer for the aged.

Program On Weathering

"Weathering Your Home For Energy Savings" was the topic of the program which followed. Donella Pantel stressed the importance of weathering "in light of decreasing availability of and increasing cost of energy." She showed television film on the subject prepared by the Texas Extension Service.

Tax deductions available for weathering a home were discussed by Nat Goodwin retired tax consultant from Columbus. He pointed out that a 15% credit for up to \$2,000 per home is available for weathering and this credit comes right off the bottom line - to income tax owed" added the consultant.

A delicious meal, leaf luncheon, prepared by the Nada Catholic Women, was enjoyed by the large gathering at the Fair.

Eagle Lake Community Hospital in concert with Wharton County Junior College is pleased to announce that a feasibility study is underway at Wharton County Junior College in Wharton to determine public interest in a proposed associate of applied science degree in medical laboratory technology according to Dr. Wayne Vanderpool, dean of occupational programs.

The survey is being conducted in the college's continuing efforts to develop programs that meet the needs of our service area," indicates Vanderpool.

Prospective students or institutions and other employers who need medical laboratory technologists are urged to contact Vanderpool or his secretary, Mrs. Evelyn Jettolina, at (713) 632-4560, extension 213.

Medical laboratory technicians play an important role in the life and health-sustaining efforts of the health profession performing basic procedures in medical laboratories that serve as vital centers for research and testing to help doctors in the

diagnosis and treatment of disease, says Eagle Lake Hospital Administrator John Chisholm.

MLTs conduct such tests as collecting blood samples, grouping and typing blood, preparing and staining slides, taking electrocardiograms and basal metabolism tests. Duties can also include preparing and identifying specimens, analyzing body fluids for their chemical and biological components and preparing solutions for use in the laboratories. Other responsibilities involve keeping accurate records of tests performed, storing and labeling blood and plasma, and cleaning and sterilizing lab equipment.

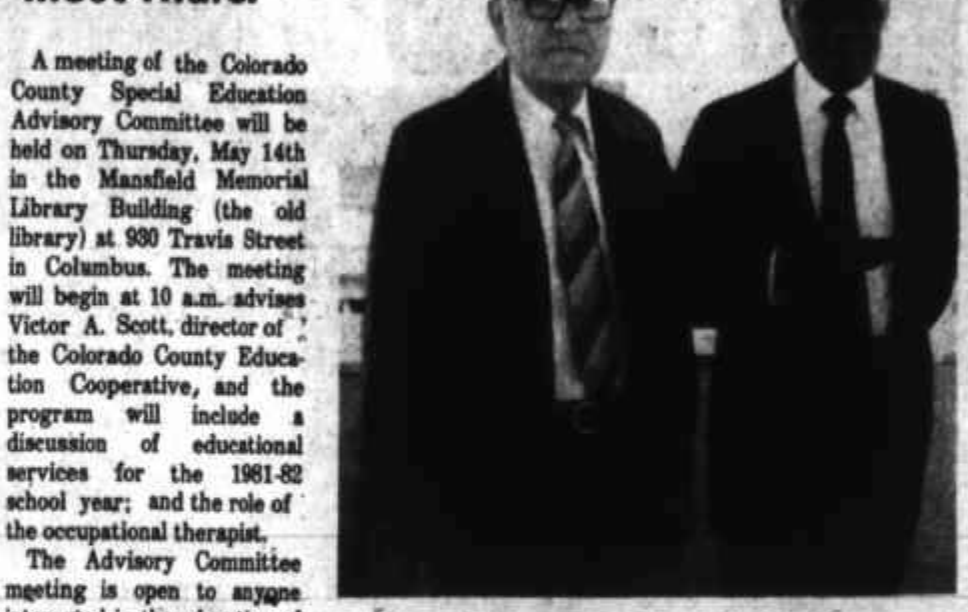
Course work for the two years of educational preparation covers such areas as microbiology, chemical analysis, human anatomy and laboratory methods.
