Dr. Curtis C. Laughlin Is Member Of AAFP

Dr. C. Curtis Laughlin has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, was the first national medical group to require members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., is instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

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Arc Welding Short Course In E.B. Next Week

The pack of dogs, one of which was apparently the mother of several smaller black dogs, began barking on the goats, slashing throats and bodies viciously, early Tuesday and before Mr. Austin could begin shooting at the pack of dogs, most of the herd had been downed, many killed instantly and at least a half dozen mortally wounded.

It was one of the most vicious attacks on livestock in this area. Previous instances had been reported in recent years of dogs attacking some show hogs at the Rice FFA student farm east of Eagle Lake; and about two years ago a pack of dogs killed five goats in a similar attack at the Austin home; and other livestock in the area were killed by packs of dogs.

Veterinarian Karen Evers Koneschek was called to the scene and administered aid to the wounded animals, however, most were so severely injured that they too died or had to be disposed of.

The Austins have taken great pride in their herd of goats and had been working to develop a larger breed of hornless goats. Their efforts received a big setback Tuesday morning.

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Tise Is Winner In Highway Dept. "55 For Texas" Contest

Twenty high school students from across the state including Bert Tise, valedictorian of Rice High School's class of 1981, have won prizes in the "55 for Texas" editorial contest.

The students submitted editorials on the merits of the 55 mph speed limit and were required to compete within their school before being eligible for regional competition.

The contest was sponsored by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, the Texas Education Agency, the Texas Joint Council of Teachers of English, and the Texas Association of Journalism Directors.

The 20 winners were chosen by local high school English and Journalism teachers from 125 participating schools to represent each of the 20 Education Service Center districts in the state. Regional winners were then judged by a team of capitol press corps reporters employed by the Houston Chronicle, Dallas Times Herald, and Austin American Statesman.

C. of C. Resolution Endorses Proposed One-Way Streets

Directors and members of the Eagle Lake Chamber of Commerce met for a noon luncheon meeting at Broecker's Restaurant in Eagle Lake Monday and adopted a resolution supporting the proposal to make Commerce Street in front of the First National Bank and the street at the rear of the Post Office one-way streets.

C.C. director Roy Dean Van Nort, also a city councilman, reported that the council has initiated a study on the proposal to make Commerce Street from Main Street to the Southern Pacific Railroad track crossings one way, in a south to north direction; and also to continue the one-way designation from east to west on the street behind the post office and municipal building.

The motion directed that a resolution be sent to the city council indicating support for the proposal if surveys indicate the designation would be feasible and beneficial to the safety and convenience of the motoring public in the downtown area.

A previous attempt to make such a one-way street designation was abandoned in the light of stiff resistance; however, the bank now occupies the entire block on the east side of Commerce and the west and proponents believe that the one-way designation would improve the flow of traffic to the bank's drive-through area and also to the public

Plans Laid For County Law Enforcement Task Force

Colorado County Sheriff Jim Broussard has initiated a program destined to improve cooperation between law enforcement officers in Colorado County this improving and coordinating law enforcement in this county.

Monday, county, state and city senior law enforcement officers held a meeting to start formulating a County Task Force to better enable to assist each other in combating crimes in Colorado County. Attending the meeting were Sheriff Jim Broussard and Chief Deputy James Parrell for the County; Texas Ranger Ray Nutt; Department of Public Safety Sgt. Gilbert Kiel; and Texas Liquor Control Officer Al Holland for the State; and Columbus, Weimar and Eagle Lake Police Chiefs Tom Wine, Ken Hollan and Earl Winebrenner, respectively.

"These officers will work together on all major crimes or burglaries which occur within Colorado County; and will work together on all investigations regardless in what area of the county the crime is committed," said Sheriff Broussard. "This will enable all law enforcement departments to be aware of all investigations being conducted within Colorado County and will enable the police to better serve the public."

Other items such as central warrant files, utilization of the police radios, etc. were discussed at the meeting. The meeting held Monday was to start formulating the responsibility each department will have in each incident added the sheriff.

The next meeting will be held on June 1th.
