Picloram Controls
McCartney Rose

Picloram pellets (5% active ingredient) applied at 1 lb./acre rate in June or September after a controlled burn on the Coastal Prairie in February, gave excellent control of McCartney rose regrowth for at least two growing seasons. Picloram pellets (5% or 10% active ingredient) at 1 lb./acre active ingredient also effectively controlled McCartney rose when applied directly into the ash immediately after burning in the winter or early spring. Generally, there was no difference in effectiveness between the 5% and 10% formulations of picloram pellets, applied at the same rate of active ingredient. Higher application rates (1.5 or 1.8 lb./acre/active ingredient) tended to only slightly improve McCartney rose regrowth control on burned areas over control by 1 lb./acre active ingredient. The picloram pellet application extends the beneficial effects of prescribed burning on McCartney rose-infested rangeland. Prescribed burning eliminates the debris which prevents uniform grazing distribution and poses livestock handling problems following herbicide applications.

Fire Blight of Pear. Fire blight of pear infection is being observed throughout the county at this time. Symptoms are initially observed as black spots on pear leaves which eventually will progress to the entire leaf turning black, drying, and falling off of the tree. Advanced stages of the disease will exhibit dead limbs in varying stages from just the limb terminal (no extension of the entire limb). Commonly one will see 6-12" of limb dead with the leaves attached and in a dark state. Fruit will also turn black. The

darkened coloration of the dead limbs demonstrates a scorched look and consequently the name "Fire Blight of Pear" arose. The blight is caused by a bacterial infection that overwinters in the dead infected leaves that lay on the ground under the tree. Once the limb begins to die you have a systemic level of infection from which the bacteria will arise in the spring of the year and infest new limb growth and leaf growth.

Control is two phase. First one must cut out all diseased limbs by cutting with your shears the limbs in healthy green wood. Disinfect the shears prior to each cut by dipping them into a chlorine solution as failure to do so may spread the disease to healthy wood on the tree. Wash the shears well after pruning to prevent rusting of metal. Rake all leaves from under the tree and burn them along with the pruned limbs. Secondly one may spray the pear foliage on monthly intervals after completion of blooming with a Kocide 101 solution. The spraying will serve as a preventative measure but will not control an ongoing infection.

Be Careful With Pills
The elderly — people over 65 — make up 11 percent of the U.S. population, but they buy and take 25 percent of all prescription drugs. Tuberculosis, which is found more often in older than in younger people, is a disease that can be cured by medicine, according to the American Lung Association of Texas. Constancy and consistency are required for proper drug-taking. Tuberculosis treatment demands the taking of medicine for months, sometimes years and this is where the problem begins.

One reason older people take more drugs is that they tend to have long-term illnesses. Rules for proper drug-taking, however, apply equally to the young and the elderly.

Beware Of Many
Poisonous Plants

At least 75 plants that grow in Texas are poisonous and can cause death, illness,

or extreme discomfort to people, a local conservation leader warned this week. Connie Fair, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, at Columbus, said parents should be cautioned because many of the plants or common flower and vegetable gardens; in ornamental landscaping; and in range, pasture, or forest lands. Bulbs, roots, seeds, leaves, beans, stems, or berries may contain poison, depending on the species of plant.

"Chewing, swallowing, or otherwise contacting the toxic parts of these plants, trees, and shrubs takes a heavy toll," Fair said. "Each year health services report that about 12,000 children are poisoned or injured by these sources."

"In fact, we have already heard of two children in Texas ages 2½ and 3, who ate deadly silverleaf nightshade berries earlier this year," Fair continued. He said the beautiful oleander bush is one of the most poisonous plants in Texas and is grown all over the state. Jimsonweed, sometimes called thorn apple and stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes many poisonings. Difenbachia, or dumb cane, is a beautiful house plant grown in millions of homes, but merely biting its stalk can cause swelling of the mouth and tongue that can be deadly. Castor bean seeds are also deadly. Mesquite, or mountain laurel, is also dangerous.

Other common plants in Texas that have poisonous parts include poinsettia, mistletoe, elephant ear, larkspur, azalea, lantana canna, yew, oaks, water hemlock, poison hemlock, poison ivy, poison oak, and poison sumac.

"More detailed information on these and other plants can be secured from health and plant authorities," Fair said. "However, SCS offices in our state's 301 soil and water conservation districts are trying to cooperate fully with the National Safety Council in keeping the public alerted to poisonous plants."

An 18-minute slide show entitled "Poisonous Plants in Texas" can be borrowed through local SCS offices to show dangerous plants.

Is Honored

The SACCARAPPA newsletter of the Galveston Historical Foundation reported in the May, 1981 issue, that Mrs. Elbert B. Whorton, Jr. (the former Evangeline Loessin of this city) was the first recipient of the President of the Galveston Historical Foundation Award for Distinguished Service.

The presentation of the award was a surprise part of the program at the Foundation's annual membership address and party last March in the Gärten Verein Dancing Pavilion in Galveston.

The award was established by President Andrew Leslie as a way of recognizing individuals who have contributed greatly to the historical Galveston by volunteering their talent, time and work. The award is symbolized by a specially designed gold medallion engraved with "GHP" and the state of Texas and a small diamond marking Galveston.

In making the award, Leslie noted that Evangeline has been Vice President Programs and now, Vice President Events and Research since the reorganization of GHP in 1973. In this capacity she has created and directed the "Dickens Evening On The Strand", developing it into the major mid-winter event in Texas and drawing tens of thousands of Galvestonians and guests. She has also created and directed the "Annual Homes Tours" during which 8 to 10 architectural, significant older private homes are shown on tour each year. She also continues to work at her first love, research on Galveston history, and has assembled exhaustive research files.

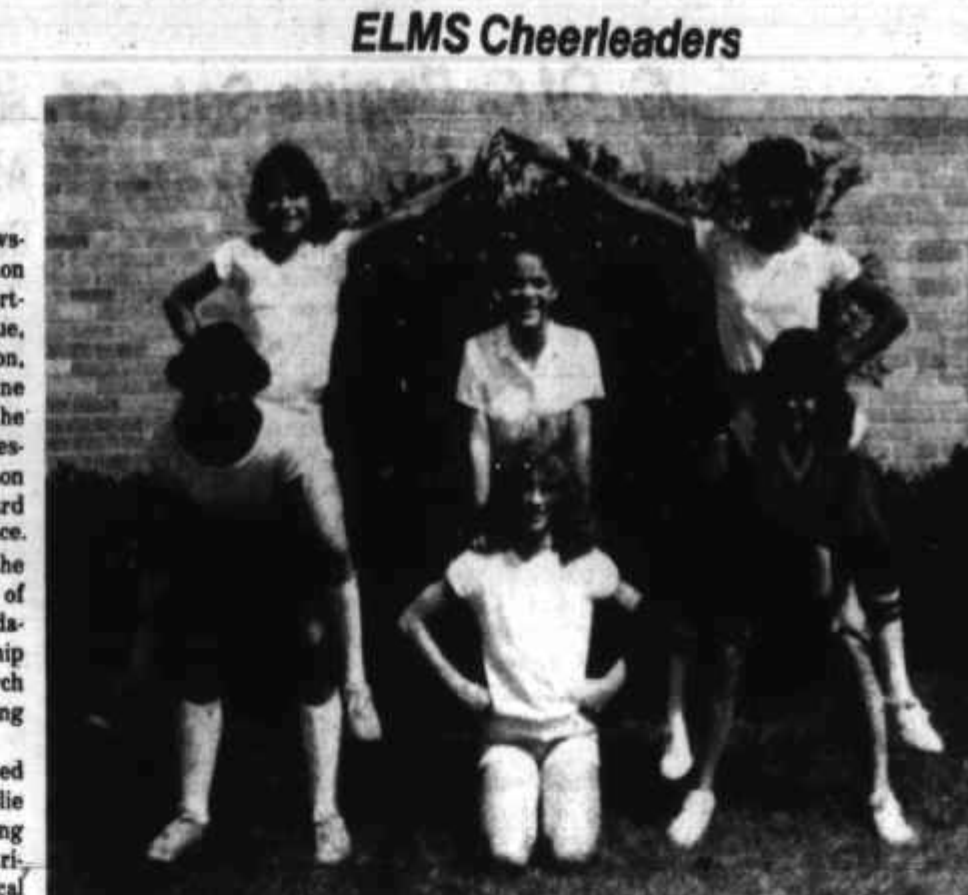

Property Owners Urged To
Meet With Boards of Equal.

Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, reminded Texans of their right to appear before local Boards of Equalization (BOE) to appeal values assigned to their property for ad valorem tax purposes.

"The right to appear before the BOE is the single most important remedy that is available to taxpayers regarding the value which is placed on property," Graeber said.

"The board is the taxpayer's opportunity to be heard in an informal setting and without incurring expensive court costs," he added.

Each local government which collects property taxes must have a board of equalization to hear taxpayer appeals on values. Most BOEs meet during May until about mid-July, Graeber said.

Taxpayers who rendered their property to the local

assessor must be notified of the time and place of the BOE meeting if the assessor increased the value rendered. Graeber said those who did not render still have the right to appear before the BOE, but persons in this category
