### Talk On Tax Bill Continues

Beneath the highly publicized stir over President Reagan's social security plans this week was continued talk and political posturing on a tax bill. For the first time, the Administration publicly announced what many of us expected - that compromise will probably be the order of the day on a tax bill. The President has staked his claim on the Kemp-Roth bill - a 10% across the board cut in individual taxes in each of three years plus accelerated depreciation. This concept is supposed to lead us to a new day of supply side economics, where people have more money to spend or invest, which stimulates the economy and promotes capital formation. However, most economists from old schools and new

schools, alike, do not put a lot of faith in a three-year tax bill, there are new round of inflation from overstimulating the economy and amassing big budget deficits. Most businesses cannot really tell two years in advance how money will come in the front door, how much will be paid out the back door and how much profit remains - such an exercise is similarly difficult for a government. A straight Kemp-Roth plan for the so-called "average family of four" would provide only enough extra cash to pay off the charge accounts instead of buying 100 shares of stock.

House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski of Illinois has recommended a bill to target tax relief in several areas to accomplish specific goals: capital formation, savings incentives, stimulation of research and development and personal tax relief. I have endorsed this approach. Because there is very little support for a straight Kemp-Roth bill, the Administration is apparently trying for some behind the scenes compromise. We read reports about a deal being struck after meetings between the President and groups of House and Senate members. They are exploring variations on Kemp-Roth and even other measures not heretofore mentioned. However, no sturdy compromise has yet arisen. There is far more smoke than fire. No compromise will be hatched without the active participation or stamp of approval from Chairman Rostenkowski and the ranking Republicans, Barber Conable of New York. As the third-ranking Democrat on the Ways and Means Committee, I will continue to offer my views. With the decision made to talk, compromise, we could well see some sort of multi-year tax approach, but with less inflationary risks than Kemp-Roth. With the difference, we can direct emphasis to some of the targeted approaches which I favor.

### ACT Tests Scheduled At WCJC

High School graduates who have not taken an ACT or SAT test but plan to attend Wharton County Junior College in Wharton this fall have four opportunities to participate in an ACT Residual Test according to Billy Griffith, counselor. The ACT Assessment Program is a guidance-oriented service that is used each year by students throughout the nation as part of their college and career planning. The first Residual ACT Assessment Test will be administered Wednesday, June 24 at 8 a.m. in Room 102 of the J. R. Peace Building. The test will also be given at the same place and time on Thursday, July 9 and Tuesday, August 4. A final residual test is scheduled Saturday, September 5 after fall semester classes begin on August 31.

The fee is \$9.50 for the test which takes students about three and one-half hours to complete, there are four standardized exams covering subject areas of English, math, social studies and natural sciences.

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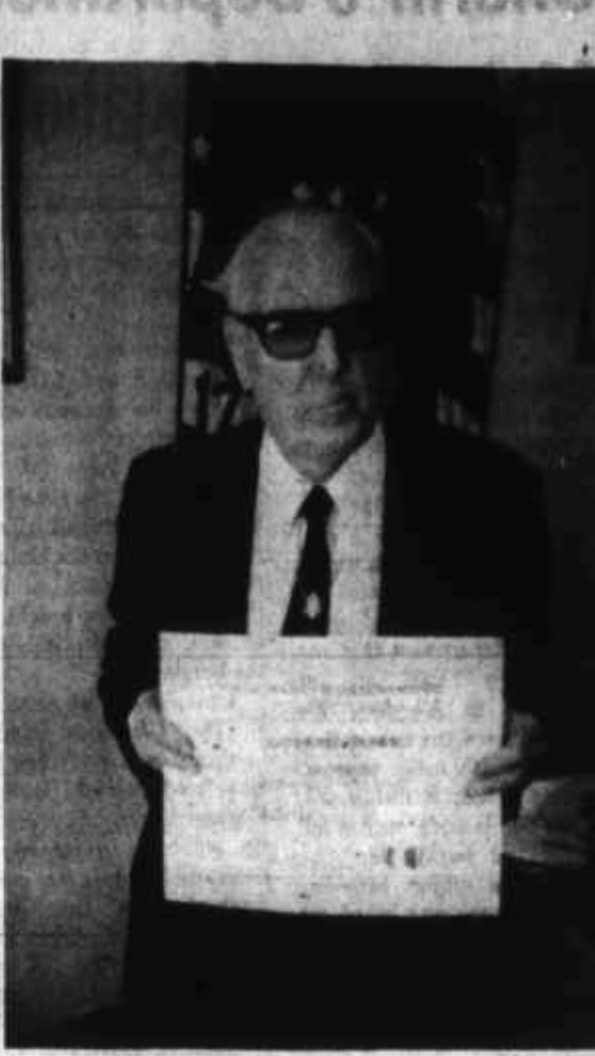

Fertilize Summer Grasses

Cong. Pickle Discusses Social Sec. Proposals

The Reagan Administration last week released its long-awaited recommendations on social security. And as chairman of the Subcommittee on Social Security, my phone barely stopped ringing as reporters and individuals, alike, wanted to know how they would be affected. As you know, our subcommittee has given a full hearing to any and all approaches. We may disagree on specific points, but we all agree that the time to act is now.

So this provision would have little short-term impact. Despite the differences, our bills do have some things in common, including an end to the penalty on outside income. While the Administration proposes many changes that may be hard to take, at least the plan is advanced with sincerity. Our subcommittee will give a full hearing to any and all approaches. We may disagree on specific points, but we all agree that the time to act is now.

Students register alphabetically as follows: 8:30 a.m. - A through D, 9:30 a.m. - E through J, 10:30 a.m. - K through M, 1 p.m. - N through S, and 2 p.m. - T through Z.
