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Accidents Take Toll Of Young People

The leading cause of death among young people in Texas is traffic accidents, according to Colonel Jim Adams, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"DPS statistics show that during 1980, 1,896 people from infancy through age 24 were killed in traffic accidents on Texas streets and highways. This is 43 percent of the total traffic deaths," Adams said. He pointed out that 4,424 persons were killed last year in Texas traffic accidents.

"The real tragedy is that so many of these deaths could be avoided if more people of every age would wear their seat belts," noted Adams.

The DPS director pointed out that some people mistakenly believe they can protect themselves during a crash by bracing their arms and legs. "Collisions usually happen too fast to permit this. Even if there was time, the forces involved in a collision are too great to withstand," said Adams.

Three out of four fatal crashes happen within 25

His father had died when Charles was seven, and when his mother died in 1935, he left for Austin to try out for the University of Texas football team. From 1939-46, he roughed it in the oil fields and served four years in the Air Force. He returned to complete his degree requirements at the University in 1946.

While working in the Hardin Oil Field near Liberty, Texas, he met Lois Cessa whom he married in 1940. Naiser is descended from pioneer Liberty County family, one of whom members is a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence.

The Naisers have four children. Chuck was born in 1945; Elvye, in 1946; and twins, Stephanie and Steve, in 1955. (Stephanie is now Mrs. Glen Sunderman of Eagle Lake.)

Naiser has been active in civic affairs through such organizations as Lions Club and the volunteer fire department. A great deal of growth occurred in the area during Naiser's tenure and, consequently, the school plant grew to accommodate it.

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Dr. Ugarte Speaks On Threats Of Communism

Dr. Jose Ugarte of Eagle Lake presented a very informative and thought-provoking program at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club on Wednesday noon when he discussed the threats of Communism as were witnessed in his experiences in Cuba and Geneva, Switzerland.

Dr. Ugarte spent some time in Geneva with an uncle who was the ambassador from Cuba to Switzerland while recuperating from polio contracted while studying toward his medical degree in Spain.

He recounted experiences which he encountered and conversations with his uncle relative to activities of Communism in Geneva which was the headquarters of most United Nations activities.

The doctor stressed that communists infiltrated all agencies of the U.N. programs and held a controlling interest despite the fact that the United States paid 35% of the budget from the years of 1948 through 1962. "They have opposed, with a great degree of success, everything which the United States stands for," noted Dr. Ugarte.

He observed that the Russian embassy depicted from the outside the role of communism but actually the controlling interests came from other communists.

Many of whom represented countries like Czechoslovakia, Rumania and other countries which appeared on the surface to be friends of the United States.

He also discussed the role of the Chinese in Geneva for seventeen years before actually becoming admitted to the United Nations.

Dr. Ugarte stressed that there are too many of our nation's leaders who look at

world from within," said the speaker. He stressed the need for educating our youth against the perils of communism. "Historically, the communist has a need to conquer" and added that their efforts are never relaxed, as compared to the apathetic feeling which prevails over much of America.

In concluding Dr. Ugarte related experiences which came from Cuba which provided the dreadful truth that communist-controlled Cuba is an island of missile bases poised for action against the United States despite the fact that the communists alleged that they had removed missiles from the Cuban bases during the missile crisis during President John Kennedy's administration. "The woods and the mountain cover of Cuba are full of missile bases poised for action on a moment's notice against the United States," alleged Dr. Ugarte as he urged that the people of the U.S.A. and the free world remain ever vigilant against the threats from communism, from within respective governments, and from fiscal properties only a few miles from the shores of this country.
