Officials at the Eagle Lake Community Hospital have announced the acquisition of a new item of equipment for utilization in the Physical Therapy Department.

Since the arrival of warmer weather and the onset of more strenuous outdoor activities, the increased incidence of muscle strain or onset of chronic low back pain syndrome, Don Riehe, L.P.T., R.P.T., Physical Therapist at the Eagle Lake Community Hospital, announced the availability of a Transcutaneous Electric Nerve Stimulator (T.E.N.S.) which is now being employed as part of the hospital's progressive program of providing the latest or newest treatment services or modalities for its patients.

The Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulator is a relatively new non-invasive, non-narcotic concept of pain management. The equipment is designed to handle "Trigger Points" or small areas of localized sensitivity and pain found in muscles and connective tissues. "Trigger Points" may be produced by trauma, chronic strain, stress from functional daily activities or postural habits. Though local in nature, discomfort may be referred through the autonomic nerve fibers to other areas of the body (so called "Referred Pain").

Treatment is widespread and successful with the T.E.N.S. unit in both acute and chronic conditions, reports Riehe. Perhaps the most remarkable use of the T.E.N.S. unit is the Post-operative Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulator (T.E.N.S.) which is now being employed as part of the hospital's progressive program of providing the latest or newest treatment services or modalities for its patients.

Albert Dutcher Families Have Reunion In Lissie

The family's mother and many of the children came in the passenger train. Albert was 1 1/2 years old and Mrs. Briggs was 3 1/2. Their first home in Texas was about one-half mile north of Lissie. It was blown from under the family in the big 1900 Galveston hurricane while family members were tied to the roots of a big tree to keep from being blown away.

Rice CISD OK's Bid For Fuel Storage

The board of education of the Rice Consolidated School District met Monday night and authorized the purchase of a bulk gasoline storage facility for the district, to be placed at the Rice High School location, at a cost of \$20,217.65.

The board was due to open bids on Wednesday last week but the opening was postponed until Monday night of this week. Two bids were received. A "turn key" bid by Station Equipment and Maintenance Inc. of Victoria for \$20,217.65 was the low bid and the board awarded the contract to that firm, contingent on satisfactory status of the company. The installation will include a 10,000 gallon steel tank, a 3,000 gallon steel tank, gas pumps, locks, erection of a concrete island and cover, water hoses, air compressors and other items needed to make the facility a complete vehicle service area.
