alleged coercion and threat to commit, in the future, the felony offense of arson by giving a serious threat of a bomb to be placed in the two businesses places in Columbus.

The threats at the Citizen office came on the same day of the sudden death of the paper's publisher, Jim Belcher, on Monday, April 27th. Kipf was arrested the next day after a "trap" was placed on the Citizen phone at the Sonic Drive In at Columbus where he was serving as manager.

In each case Kipf reportedly sought to obtain \$5000 from the businesses or threatened that a bomb would be placed in the respective locations.

Final Inspection Fri. Of Courthouse Restoration

Colorado County Judge Lester J. Cranek announced this week that the final inspection of the courthouse restoration project has been scheduled for 8:00 a.m. this Friday, June 12th.

At that time the county judge, members of the Commissioners' Court, the Historical Society's advisory committee, the contractor Circle Double (C) Contracting Co. representatives, representatives of the Mechanical Engineering firm for the project, and the Project Director Arthur J.
