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Audit Shows City Finances Are Good

Eagle Lake City Council, in session on Tuesday of last week, received and accepted an audit of city funds as made by Certified Public Accountant William Pierce Arthur, Jr. of Columbus. The report showed all city funds to be in good shape. The auditor did recommend that deposits be made into the city's depository on a daily instead of a weekly basis. The audit of funds was for the city's fiscal year April 1, 1980 through March 31, 1981. Copies of the audit are available for public inspection in the city offices in the Municipal Building.

The audit showed that the City in the past fiscal year had total revenue of \$429,123, up \$82,629 over the revenue anticipated in the 1980-81 budget, plus a \$30,000 revenue sharing allocation. Expenditures, meanwhile, also increased from the budgeted figure of \$379,500 to \$419,459; plus a revenue sharing expenditure of \$17,335 on the sewer plant project. This left the city with an excess of \$42,664 for the fiscal year.

Reserves and fund balances at the end of the year were: General Fund, \$631,091; Revenue Sharing Fund, \$64,416; Special Revenue Funds, \$23,761; and Capital Projects Funds, \$13,130.

On March 31, 1981, the city had outstanding \$785,000 in bonds; \$475,000 general obligation bonds and \$310,000 revenue bonds, and it is estimated interest in these

will total \$300,280 by the time fiscal payment is made in 1994.

Water, Sewer Revenue Up The audit notes that sale of water and sewer series (including garbage collection) totaled \$302,929 up from \$216,000 anticipated in the budget and compared to \$210,119 revenue in 1979-80.

Since the city has sold the gas system to Entex, this is the last time for the gas department to be included in the audit. Revenue for the portion of year under city ownership revenue in the gas department totaled \$251,897 which included a \$78,715 gain in sale of the gas system, and expenditures totaled \$206,067.

Statistical Support CPA Arthur included in his report a statistical section. It showed that general fund revenue increased from 1972 to 1981 from \$176,422 to \$462,123 but expenditures increased likewise from \$148,605 to \$419,459. Property valuations for tax purposes went up in the same period, 1972 to 1981, from \$1,280,390 to \$4,232,060 (assessed values).

Net bonded indebtedness was \$556,452 in 1972 or 71 per capita and a 4.1% ratio to assessed valuations as compared to bonded debt in 1981 of \$456,527 or \$118 per capita on a ratio of 4.7%.

This compares to a bonded debt of \$1,367,921 for the Rice School District (as of Aug. 31, 1980) or a per capita debt of \$46 as Eagle Lake residents' share of the total Rice CSD debt.

Costs \$550 After accepting the audit, the council approved payment of \$550.00 to CPA Arthur for preparing the 1980-81 audit.

New Electrocardiograph Service At Hospital

Hospital will tie in with the Houston based Cardiologist office computer and will provide a complete written report or analysis within five minutes.

The new equipment can provide a twelve lead E.C.G. tracing in just ten seconds and utilizes a three channel tracing technique. According to hospital officials it is very pleasing to offer this new equipment and service to area residents. Jose M. Ugarte, M.D., is Chief of the Medical Staff at the Eagle Lake Community Hospital and Lois Mallory, ARRT, is the Department Supervisor and E.C.G. Technician.

Initially and before the patient is disconnected from the tracing machine a computer at the cardiologist's office will automatically review the individual patient's heart tracings against a "normal" tracing for a person of similar age, height, and weight.

Computer Alert If "abnormal" variations on the tracings appear, the computer will alert the cardiologist who will immediately overread the patient's latest monitoring tapes, call for adjustments in the machine, request additional tests or tracings, and consult directly and immediately by telephone with the patient's local physician to suggest treatment, medication or other vital steps in order to provide rapid treatment for cardiac illness or distress cases.
