TODAY'S MANUFACTURED HOMES

IDENTICAL PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS
The physical characteristics of today's site-delivered factory-built homes have become identical to a site-built home. One of the primary differences in site-delivered and site-built homes is that site-delivered homes are required by law to be constructed to stringent federal standards set by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Each site-delivered manufacturer must have its plans, engineering specifications, and plant quality control programs approved by a design-build firm (or state agency) to ensure design compliance with code standards, including plumbing and electrical. Federal regulations also require that each manufactured home be inspected during the construction process. The HUD national manufactured home code and these three codes (IBC, SBC, or BOCA) are substantially comparable. For example, all incorporate the National Electrical Code, and require the use of certain flame retardant materials and establish wind loading criteria. However, the highest inspection procedures for manufactured housing - to ensure code compliance - are ordinarily far superior to those utilized at the local level for site-built homes.
