Hunters Alerted To Law Changes

Hunters are advised by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department that several hunting regulations set recently by the Parks and Wildlife Commission have been disapproved by commissioners' courts in some counties.

Presently, 30 counties have the alternative to either approve or disapprove regulations adopted by the commission. Department officials said only four out of the 30 counties approved all the recommended items.

Changes proposed for the 1981-82 hunting seasons which were disapproved in some counties included: an either-sex deer hunting season, which would eliminate the requirement for antlerless deer permits and allow hunters to tag the antlerless deer.

However, it also empowers the Parks and Wildlife Commission to make grants if it so desires to appropriate international nonprofit organizations for the purpose of acquiring, developing, and maintaining waterfowl propagation areas within the Dominion of Canada that provide waterfowl for the Central Flyway.

Contract July 23 After reviewing all the bidders' qualifications and marketing proposals, the commission would award a contract in its July 23 meeting. The original art, camera ready copy and any other information required should be submitted to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4000 Smith County Road, Austin, Texas 78744.

The successful bidder would assume all responsibility for producing, promoting and selling prints of the stamp art, and would pay the department on a royalty basis.

The state waterfowl stamp would be available from department offices across the state prior to the opening of the 1981-82 waterfowl season.

\$5 State Waterfowl Stamp To Be Required For 1981-82

If Gov. Bill Clements signs Senate Bill 709, as expected, waterfowl hunters in Texas will be required to purchase a \$5 state waterfowl stamp which can be purchased at post offices.

Use Limited Senate Bill 709 specifies that funds accruing from state waterfowl stamp sales may be spent only for "research, management, and protection for waterfowl, for the acquisition, lease, or development of waterfowl habitats in the state."

special archery only deer seasons; and removal of differential protection for spike bucks (bucks which are yearling or older have single antlers protruding through the skin without prongs or forks).

None of these apply however to Colorado and surrounding counties. Hunters planning to venture afield this hunting season should check the department's Guide to 1981-82 Hunting and Sport Fishing Regulations booklet, which will be available at hunting license outlets across the state prior to September 1.

The guide will include regulations affected by county commissioners' court action, but not regulations added by the 67th Texas Legislature.

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Fewer Drownings Reported In '80

Fewer water-related fatalities were recorded in 1980 than the previous year in Texas, water safety officials have announced.

The 570 drownings in calendar year 1980 compared to 628 during 1979. Water safety officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said reductions were noted in three categories. Boating fatalities dropped from 132 to 138, motor vehicle-related fatalities dropped from 56 to 38; fishing without a boat, 32 to 18; and swimming, 207 to 189.

During 1980, slightly more fatalities resulted from falls. It compared to 110 in 1979, and wading, 44, one more than 1979.
