Sheriff Is Chief Law Enforcer In The County

I would like to brief our citizens on the functions of the Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff is elected by the people over the entire county. He is the Chief Law Enforcement Officer in the county. The three incorporated cities within the county have their own police departments and the Sheriff's main attention is directed at the unincorporated towns within the county; however, Sheriff's officers have authority inside the incorporated cities.

The only law we can not enforce inside a city limit is a City Ordinance. We urge you to utilize your local city police and we do not intend to interfere in their operation; however, if they are busy when you call, or if for any reason you want the Sheriff's Department, we are here to serve all the people. We work with all city police departments to better serve all our citizens.

A group of Eagle Lake area Scouts and Leaders have returned from an exciting 12-day stay at Philmont Scout Ranch and Explorer Base, near Cimarron, New Mexico, which is operated by the Boy Scouts of America, the world's largest camping facility, covering 214 square miles.

The Scouts were: Jeffery Argo, William Plesner, Bill Green, Shawn Spaniel, Julian Flores and Randal Duarte. They were among 10,000 young scouting men and women who will hike Philmont's mountainous trails this summer.

The group was under the adult leadership of Scoutmaster Verlin Argo and Edward Sunderman. During their 12-day stay at Philmont, they backpacked between 50 and 75 miles, visiting several of the ranch's 23 mountain camps. At these camps, they were instructed in such things as rock-climbing, camping outdoors, conservation, and other programs. In addition, all scouts were accompanied for their first two days by a Philmont Ranger, who instructed them in the basics of backpacking and survival.

The Eagle Lake area youths are members of Boy Scout Troop No. 334 sponsored by Eagle Lake Rotary Club.

The Eagle Lake group departed with others from the Sam Houston Area Council on a chartered bus.
