1981 Rice Harvest Gets Underway In This Area

Numerous Farmers Have Started Combining. Rush Begins Next Wk.
Harvest of the 1981 rice crop, expected to be an average to above average crop, started late last week and more and more farmers are moving into the fields and the combining should be pretty general over this area by the end of this week or early last week.
As far as we have been able to learn from area rice dryers, Joe Mahalik, operating as J-Cattle Co., was the first to combine rice in the Eagle Lake area. He brought LaBelle rice to the Eagle Lake Rice Dryer last Thursday, Henry Sunderman, normally one of the first to begin combining annually, started combining Sunday.
From the Garwood-Nada area Joe Popp began combining LaBelle rice also last Thursday and he took his rice to the Garwood Rice Dryer.
Kallina Dryer in Altair started taking rice from Arlin Miller last Friday; Altair Dryer began receiving rice from Roy Stallman and Sons also Friday.
Other area rice dryers received rice this week and more are due to start combining as each day passes.
Reports have been received that the quality of the rice looks "pretty good" despite the fact that there is some smut in the rice due to the recent wet weather. Doyle Waldrop, grader at the Eagle Lake office of the American Rice Growers Co-op, said this week that samples he had seen to date showed some smut but little, he added, "It's too early to tell much about the overall situation at this time."

engineering firm of Bernard Johnson, Inc. This, he said, leaves the city with \$44,536 (which had been paid previously from the revenue sharing fund) to go with the \$350,000 bond issue approved unanimously by the voters to make a total of \$394,536 available to cover the city's 25% share of the costs (\$388,000).
Application for the grant amendment is expected to be made immediately and also the bids approved by the council will be forwarded to EPA and TDWR for their approval before work can begin.
Mayor Struss and councilmen indicated the city has reached the "point of no return" on this project and approved the resolution to accept the bids unanimously.
It is estimated that the final acceptance could take from six weeks to two months and then the contractor has one year in which to complete the project.

Complete the Project
On the project and the council's discussion of the engineering costs with Bernard Johnson representatives will be published in next week's paper.
Ordinances Approved
In other action, the council in almost rapid-fire order approved the third and final reading of the city's new ordinances amending rates for building permit fees, dog impoundment fees, and plumbing permit fees. The new fees went into effect immediately after passing the third reading Tuesday night.
Also, the second readings of the Dangerous Building Ordinance and the Weed Ordinance were passed. Only dissenting vote came from Councilman Alvin Kohleffel on the second reading of the weed ordinance. Final reading of the two ordinances is expected at the August 11th meeting.

Join In Pledge Rate Fight
The council voted to join the members of the Texas Municipal League in opposing the rate hike proposed by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. before the Texas Public

Utilities Commission, at a cost of \$137.24.
A request to amend administrative portions of CPL's tariff schedule was tabled to the next meeting. The proposal does not increase any residential or commercial rates, emphasized the mayor.
The council also tabled action on a decision to allow the Colorado County Central Appraisal District to assess and collect taxes in 1982 at an estimated cost of \$3822 (provided all nine entities in the district participate).
To Take Paving Bids
City Manager Bob Klockman was authorized to advertise for bids for a paving program on the city's streets on a unit basis with the bid opening set for 10 a.m. Aug. 4th. A special meeting will probably be called later to accept the bids, indicated the mayor.
New Dog Catcher
Klockman reported that the city has finally hired a humane officer to serve as "dog catcher." Marvin Peyton is expected to begin duties in that position this week. He is moving here from Ohio. He was instructed to catch, not kill, dogs unless dire emergency circumstances exist and to place them in the city pound under the city's current dog ordinance.

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Jury Awards No Damages In 5-Year-Old Potter-Golla Suit
A District Court jury returned a verdict last Thursday denying damages asked by Douglas Potter from J. W. Golla as the result of an accident which occurred about five years ago.
In the suit, Potter alleged that he was helping Golla put a tarp on a truck and that the tarp was jerked and that he fell off the back and injured his feet on impact with the ground. He asked for damages for lost wages, past and future medical expenses and other items.
The jury heard the case Wednesday and Thursday deliberated less than an hour in returning a decision that there was no negligence on the part of either party, hence made no award to the plaintiff Potter.

Sheriff's Office Investigates Theft Of License Plates
Theft of a license plate from a vehicle owned by a Columbus man was investigated by the County Sheriff's Department last Sunday, July 12th at 9:45 a.m. Clarence Williams of Columbus reported the theft of the license plates on his vehicle. Williams said he parked his vehicle at the State Highway Department on U.S. 90 West of Columbus when he reported for work at 6:30 a.m. When he returned to his car at 9:30 a.m., the plates were missing.
The investigation continues.

Damages Asked Of Exterminating Co.
Jack Kroll filed a suit in District Court in Columbus Friday against Orkin Exterminating Co., Inc. seeking damages resulting from a contract for termite inspection of his home.
Kroll contends in the petition that in the Spring of 1978 he entered into a contract with the defendant company for treatment of termites, but the termites continued to exist and he asks for damages done in the amount of \$3,043.20 plus an additional \$3,043.20 for negligence of the defendant company in treatment and inspection.
