Voluntary Student Code Of Conduct Proposed By Atty. Gen.

Texa attorney general Mark White advises that he has proposed a Voluntary Student Code of Conduct which recently was sent to school districts around the State with the hope that it will be adopted as a guide to a better learning atmosphere in our public schools.

"The Student Code of Conduct is the first part of a three-part crime prevention program which I hope to have introduced in the public school system. In the nearly three years of those arrested for violent crimes were juveniles under 17 years of age. To be effective, a crime prevention program must reach children while their character is still in the formative stage. I am particularly concerned that children are taught their rights and responsibilities as citizenship throughout their school years, and we should not ignore students in

increasing students' knowledge and understanding of the law and the judicial system, I hope to foster a more positive attitude toward the law. The policeman should be thought of as a friend, not an enemy. The success of this program will depend very much on community leadership," he added.

"As a third part of the crime prevention program, I would like to have established a uniform requirement for all teachers in training to deal with discipline in the classroom. I would like to see developed, either as part of a requirement for a degree in education or as a requisite for teacher certification, a standard course of instruction for the training of public school teachers in classroom discipline."

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Pork Production

Led last year in hogs, 2.36 million pigs; and lamb production, 14 million head, the industry, 18.3 million head, valued its pork production, \$8.8 billion; and exports were \$700 million and tallow, \$101 million.

AUSTIN—Acting quickly in the first week of the special session, the Texas Legislature made progress toward passing three of the issues called by the Governor.

The Senate redistricting committee approved a congressional redistricting plan, while the House overwhelmingly voted to abolish the state property tax.

The Legislature created a fund to assist water projects across the state.

At each chamber this week, the leaders had taken care to endorse the lead taken each time, it will be three.

That leaves only the Justice Act and the revision of the Property Tax Act as unfinished business.

State Property Tax

In abolishing the value-added tax, the Legislature would not make much difference in taxpayers' pockets.

In 1979 the Legislature lowered the tax to a speck of a sum, and it wasn't even worth collecting. The total tax in an entire rural county might come to \$2.50.

Still, the tax remained in the Texas Constitution as the source of construction funds for 17 state universities and colleges. Attorney Gen. Mark White said that until the law was removed from the Constitution, no other revenues could be used for construction.

Following his ruling, Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls filed suit to resume collecting the tax, possibly including over \$250 in back taxes to 1979.

If the law is stricken from the Constitution, the lawsuit

might succeed in forcing the state to resume collecting the tax, which appropriates \$400 million in the budget in 1982.

The issue will reach voters on the November ballot.

Congressional Redistricting

By far the most politically sensitive issue on the Governor's agenda, the task of redrawing congressional districts was thought to become a sticking point in the special session.

The Governor wanted a plan which created a black majority district in Dallas County and also favored Republicans.

Senate Democrats wanted a plan which favored all incumbents, Democrats and Republicans, including two Dallas liberals targeted by Clements.

In a surprise move last week, the Senate committee voted to support a substitute bill by Sen. John Wilson, D-Lubbock, which was similar to Clements' plan.

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
