Provide your own home care. Be ready for emergencies with an adequate first-aid kit at home and in the car. When possible, care for a convalescing family member at home. It's much more pleasant and less expensive than a hospital or nursing facility. Most com-

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regulating the discharge of dredged or fill material in U.S. waters, he said.

When the Corps was slow to exercise its authority, a group of environmentalists took it to court and in 1975 forced it to expand its regulatory activities, the farm leader said.

"Farmers have found to their sorrow that the Corps now has authority over stock ponds, plays lakes, creek and river bottoms, and even the ditches which have water in them only when it rains," Brandt said.

Farm Bureau is supporting an amendment to the Clean Water Act that would restrict government authority over land use, according to Ted Brandt of Weimar, president of the Colorado County Farm Bureau.

"We are asking Congressmen J. Pickle to co-sponsor or strongly support legislation to amend Section 404 of the 1972 Federal Water Pollution Control (Clean Water) Act," Brandt said.

"The change would restrict Corps of Engineer Authority to waters which are navigable for interstate and foreign commerce of which can be made navigable for these purposes with reasonable effort."

Brandt said that prior to 1972, the Corps' authority was limited to protection and maintenance of navigable waters. However, Section 404 amendments that year charged the Corps with
