"Kiss Your Baby" Campaign Headed By Mrs. Kenneth Wishart In Garwood

Mrs. Kenneth Wishart was selected chairman of Garwood's 1981 fall Cystic Fibrosis "Kiss Your Baby" door-to-door campaign, the Texas Gulf Coast Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation announced.

"I'm worried that parents are failing to recognize cystic fibrosis in their children because they are not familiar with the signs of the disease," Mrs. Wishart said. "CF is often mistaken for one of the other less serious lung diseases."

Cystic fibrosis, the most common genetic killer of children in the United States, attacks a child's lungs and digestive system. One of every 1,600 American babies is born with CF and there is no cure as yet for the disease.

One of the primary goals of the campaign is to educate the community to one of the main signs of CF: abnormally salty tasting skin. "People should be aware that salty tasting skin may be a sign of cystic fibrosis," Mrs. Wishart said; adding that early diagnosis and medical treatment help to lengthen a victim's life. If you kiss your baby and his or her skin tastes salty, ask your pediatrician to run the diagnostic sweat test. Donations collected will be

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TEXAS AG FACTS

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) has notified the Environmental Protection Agency that it has declared crisis exemptions for two harvest aid desiccants, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

TDA has approved the use of paraquat for use on dried beans and field peas in the Rio Grande Plains and Winter Garden areas, and sodium chlorate for use on wheat from the sun into simple sugars in the plant.

When the leaves of the plant are grazed too short, the ability of the leaves to make food is greatly reduced. This results in loss of roots, and a reduction of plant vigor, thus making the plant weakened.

If grazing of the grass plant persists, the end result will be death of the plant simply because it cannot make any food to keep itself alive.

When continuous overgrazing occurs, this results in less available forage for livestock, and poorer quality forage. The final result of overgrazing is higher feed bills and less profit.

Undesirable plants replace the grass, and eventually these grounds is the result with ugly scars of erosion showing up on the face of the land. This is why proper grass management, and proper grazing height of grass plants are important.

As a rule of thumb, the amount of percentage of the grass plant which can safely be grazed is about 50 percent. Using this rule of thumb, and depending on the growing season, i.e. rainfall, climate and other factors, the plant will have enough leaf surface remaining to adequately produce forage, and to keep

Little day-to-day change away from this hot and mostly sunny farm weather is expected across the Texas Coastal Plains today through Saturday. High pressure dominates temporarily in the upper levels, so rain chances are restricted to an isolated late afternoon thunderstorm or two on the coast and towards the Rio Belt. All areas will continue to have a late morning dew drizzle, plus brief cloudiness during a few hours after sunrise.

For the Rio Belt, starting times for rice and sorghum harvests should average near 11 a.m. or around the time of dew drizzle. Fast rising humidity after sunset will be the main factor to bring daily bargains week and by-rising to a close rather than the isolated showers. Chances are still good for successfully completing hay-curing and baling during the next five days. Soybeans will need adequate updating of fungicide protection because of repeating overnight dew. For cotton spraying, winds and humidity either in the evening or early morning will be better for uniform coverage of insecticide treatments.
