Colorado County Has Winners In 1980 Texas Pecan Show

The 60th annual Conference of the Texas Pecan Growers Association was held in Seguin, Texas, July 12-15. The 1981 Texas State Pecan Show was held in connection with the Conference assembled in the new Seguin-Guadalupe County Coliseum near Starke Park.

Colorado County pecan growers had three pecan exhibits that made the finals from the local show in Schulenburg, the South Texas Regional Show in Austin, and to the State Show in Austin. Charles T. Treney, Weimar, won a first place ribbon and a Grand Champion plaque in the Native Pecan Division. His exhibit weighed 75.34 pounds to a pound and averaged 54.92 percent kernel.

Frank Vack, Sr. of Weimar, took a first place in the Brake Pecan variety with a tabulation of 43.74 percent per pound and 59.58 percent kernel. St. Mary's Church of Nada won a first place blue ribbon with its Eastern Schley variety tabulating 47.35 percent to a pound and 61.48 percent kernel. These were the only three pecan exhibits from Colorado County.

In all 342 pecan entries were exhibited.

Pickle's Committee OK's Cut In Estate, Gift Taxes

Last week my Ways and Means Committee tentatively approved major reductions in estate and gift taxes that go beyond the Reagan administration-backed bill currently before the Senate. Our bill is one of the most exciting our committee has approved, since it will be a major step in saving the dwindling number of small family "death tax."

The package has overwhelming bipartisan support and easily passed by voice vote of the committee.

There is concern that the current estate tax eats into too much of the estate of a farmer or rancher who dies leaving a family farm or ranch with a taxable value of \$200,000. Most small farms and ranches have equipment alone easily worth that much these days, and with an estate tax of around 30%, there have been too many cases where the family has had to sell the farm or ranch just to pay the estate tax!

The bill which our committee passed was patterned after a bill sponsored by Representative L. A. Bafalis (R-Fla.) and myself. I am ranking member on the Tax Force which formulated this bill and I am proud of my role in it. Here are some of the highlights:

1. It raises the exemption level from \$175,000 to \$600,000 over a 5-6 year period.
2. Reduces the highest estate tax rate from 70% to 50% over a four year period.
3. Retains the "special use" provision for farm and ranch valuation which values such property for its use rather than market value.
4. Raises the special use ceiling from \$500,000 to \$1 million over a three-year period.
5. Removes the "Widow's Tax" by eliminating the present limits on the estate and gift tax marital deduction so that one spouse can transfer an unlimited amount of property tax-free to the other spouse.
6. Increases the annual gift tax exemption from \$3,000 to \$10,000.
7. Establishes an unlimited gift tax exemption for amounts paid directly for the benefit of the donor for medical expenses or tuition.
8. Provides a five-year deferral of estate taxes on certain closely held businesses.

Stolen Car Recovered After Hi-Speed Chase

A 1977 Cadillac reported stolen by the Columbus police department early Saturday morning was recovered shortly afterward after a 100 mile per hour chase on Highway 90A toward Altair and with the assistance of a number of county sheriff's deputies and Highway Patrolmen.

City Sergeant Lupe Villarreal and reserve officer Connors received word of the theft of the 1977 Cadillac with a.m. Saturday. They spotted the vehicle shortly afterward at the intersection of Main and McCarty in Eagle Lake. Sergeant Villarreal said in his report that efforts to stop the vehicle were not effective and the vehicle headed west on Highway 90A toward Altair with the city patrol vehicle in hot pursuit. The vehicle refused to stop despite warning lights and sirens used by Villarreal and the driver of the Cadillac averred back and forth on the road to prevent the officer from passing.

Manuel Villarreal called for assistance from other officers. The vehicle turned south on Highway 71 toward Garwood before the sheriff's deputies could reach the intersection of 71 and 90A, but officer Chuck Smith who was heading north on 71, turned around and managed to get ahead of the fleeing vehicle and caused it to slow down enough to a point where Villarreal and Connors could get behind it.

Two men in the vehicle were arrested with the assistance of deputy Smith. The San Antonio police advised the Sheriff's office that they were not going to file auto theft charges against the sixth juvenile. She was released to her parents after \$20.00 was collected for the gas.
