'Bite Back' At Inflation Bug

Has the "inflation bug" bitten into your family fund? Bite back! First, reconsider how you want to spend your family fund time. Plan to go as a family, focusing fun on free or inexpensive things to do. Here are a few suggestions - but they're only a beginning!

Start, perhaps, with family "how-to" nights. The basic idea is to provide positive learning experiences for all of the family members - and to develop knowledge and skill that will help them become competent and independent persons. Don't try to do all of these in one evening! Some skills you might work on together are: How to use the telephone or the CB radio. How to write a check - you could explain banking, including deposits, withdrawals, savings, interest, money transfers and monthly statements, for example. How to set up personal and a family budget, and how to operate appliances in the home.

Family Service Projects
Another idea involves family service projects - doing something as a family for someone else without thought of recognition or reward. Discuss several ideas, and decide on one and do it. Family service projects could be doing lawn care for an elderly or handicapped neighbor, holding a "family cookie-baking night" and then sending the delicious delicacies to someone who would appreciate them.

There are other ideas the family can pursue away from home - collecting: rocks, coins, buttons, flowers, driftwood, native materials. And they include educational activities.

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Soybean Situation Is Described As Volatile

Soybeans, a cash crop of growing importance in Texas, will likely face ups and downs in the marketplace this year.

Extended wet weather this spring dealt a hard blow to the Texas soybean crop, causing some farmers in coastal and eastern areas to replant as many as three times. This means considerable added expenses plus low yield potentials from these late plantings.

"The fact that the average price of beans to farmers is at least a dollar higher per bushel now than at this time last year should encourage producers to forward contract at least part of the crop," points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "This would assure a profit on part of their crop and reduce their risk."

How much of a money-maker Texas soybeans prove to be this year will depend on the weather during the rest of the growing season, the overall U.S. crop and export demands, points out Feagan. The total U.S. crop will likely exceed 68.7 million acres, with some double planting behind wheat still under way. That acreage is 2 percent below last year. About 15 percent of the acreage is estimated to be double cropped, and these acres usually produce lower yields. This, in conjunction with expected lower yields from late plantings, should keep the national average yield somewhat below earlier USDA predictions of 29.5 bushels per acre.

The Texas crop will likely total 700,000 acres, about the same as last year. It would have been up considerably with favorable spring weather. Regarding exports, world demand for soybeans is up about 4 percent. That's important, notes Feagan, since more than 60 percent of U.S. beans are exported. However, the demand for soybeans and soybean products is slowing somewhat in recent weeks due to reduced livestock feeding and higher vegetable oil stocks. Meal prices are currently just under \$200 per ton.

The Soviet Union, a major importer of U.S. beans in the past, is currently negotiating with Brazil for its soybean needs, so the U.S. will have to look elsewhere. China has not filled its needs and could brighten the export picture, notes the economist.

Columbus school board raised teachers' salaries an additional \$500 above the state base level during the regular school board meeting Wednesday, July 15. The raise, effective for the upcoming school year, raises salaries \$1,000 above the state base pay level.

The board had tentatively approved a \$100 raise during the May board meeting in which Saul said the raise might increase pending a budget review later. However, Columbus teachers attended the June board meeting en masse to protest the \$100 base pay increase and to ask for more money.

Columbus school board also reviewed preliminary budget figures for year 1981-82 that call for expenditures of over \$2 million. According to School Supt. John Saul, assessed values for the Columbus Independent School District are \$112,903,822. Operating costs for 1981-82 are estimated at \$2,394,822, with more than half that figure - \$1,516,788 - going toward instruction. Saul said that amount for instruction would make the salary raise feasible. "We've got the money from this preliminary financial report to finance a salary raise to \$1,000 above," he said.
