WCJC Fall Enrollment Passes 1000 Mark

Fall enrollment at Wharton County Junior College in Wharton reached the thousand mark Wednesday as the Friday, August 7 deadline for early registration rapidly approached. The count is about equal to last year at this time but a last-week surge is expected.

Many students will prefer to enroll August 25-26 during the regular registration dates but college officials suggest "those who can should register early."

The following must be filed with the registrar prior to registration:

*An application for admission including Social Security number.

*A high school transcript if enrolling in college for the first time, or a transcript from each college attending if enrolling by transfer.

*A completed health form supplied by the college and including a certificate of immunization for diphtheria, tetanus, and d/t under 19 years of age, for polio.

*Scores on the American College Testing Program (ACT) or on the College Entrance Examination Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), except veterans and others at least twenty-one years of age.

There has been no increase in tuition and fees which must be paid at the time of registration. WCJC charges the lowest tuition permitted by State Law.

Tuition is \$4 each semester hour for both In-District and Out-of-District students and \$4 for Out-of-District residents.

A one-time \$7.50 students service fee is valid for one academic year. Laboratory fees per course range from \$2 to \$8 and a parking permit for one year costs \$2.

Savings Bond Sales

June sales of Series EE & HH United States Savings Bonds in Colorado County were reported to be \$9,122.

Sales for the first six months period totaled \$102,798 for 69 percent of the 1981 goal of \$150,000.

Texas sales during the month of June amounted to \$19,405,052, while sales for the first six months of 1981 totaled \$134,426,091 with 53 percent of the yearly sales goal of \$252.3 million reached.
