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Cong. Pickle Reports His Views On New Tax Bill

[By Con. J. J. Pickle]

The dust is beginning to settle after last week's Administration's victory on the tax bill. The President is to be congratulated that the House accepted his proposals. But despite the rhetoric on both sides, the victory was more political than economic. Differences between the Administration bill and our Ways and Means Committee version became less pronounced as the vote got closer.

Earlier this year, the President started off with a straight Kemp-Roth 30% tax cut and an accelerated depreciation for business. The Ways and Means Committee agreed on a multi-year tax reduction but with several other proposals for individuals and business to target the tax reduction. By targeting areas for relief, we felt the economy could be stimulated more effectively than a vague cut which did not itself guarantee most families meaningful tax relief.

In the final analysis, the President and many Republicans agreed. The President's final plan contained many features identical to the Committee bill — so if imitation is the highest form of flattery, the Republicans paid high honor to the Committee bill. By the time the Republican substitute reached the House floor this week, it was no longer what the President originally proposed, but rather word for word the bill the Committee wrote weeks before.

For instance, both bills contained a major reduction in gift and estate taxes — a proposal I introduced with a Republican on the Committee. Both included a deferral for reinvestment in new issue stock dividends, an idea I introduced with another Republican. Both bills included new incentives for savings through IRAs and company pension plans — I initiated

was awarded to Malvon Construction Co. of Austin on a base bid of \$18,400,000. He estimated primary engineering costs on the project at \$547,000 and said that signs for the project will cost another \$300,000 or so.

Malvon, in its bid, estimated 400 days would be required for completion but only 300 days have been required to date and the project is 96 to 97 percent completed, said Bayless. He added that up to this date the contractor has been paid \$17,600,000 on his project cost, leaving only \$1 million left to complete.

The engineer estimated that Highway 71 carries around 1500 to 6000 cars daily and that another 11,000 to 12,000 vehicles are carried on an average day on IH-10 many of which will be using the by-pass en route to Austin and points north of Columbus. He estimates that the by-pass will carry an average of 6,000 vehicles per day and has been designed with a 20-year projection in mind of carrying over 8,000 vehicles per day.
