checked the cameras on each occasion and both times found silverfish in the units and he contended that the insects were breaking the photo beams or touching the cameras to cause the alarm to sound.

Willrodt told the court that the manufacturer, Edwards Corp., did not agree with this possibility.

Contractor Seeks Rights
Clarke made an appearance in the court during the afternoon session Monday and contested some accusations made by Willrodt. He said he had been unable to get any communications through to the contractor, but Clarke contended he had been unable to get an appointment with the project director.

Clarke also contended that he had not been informed of some of the deficiencies which Willrodt says still exist, and if so, would have made an effort to get them corrected.

He opposed the court's decision to back Willrodt in hiring engineers to complete the project, saying that it gave the project director an "open check book" which would eventually be deducted from funds which he was withholding on his contract.

Clarke agreed to meet with Willrodt to try to iron out differences, as suggested by some members of the court, and a tentative date was set. Judge Crank said Willrodt to see if he could meet at that time and the judge reported to the court that Willrodt "declined to meet" with the contractor, and reportedly stated that he would be "perpetrating a crime" if he met with the contractor.

3 percent in October, 2 percent in November and 2 percent in December.

The action by the court also set aside bonuses and fees required by the county at one-half of the legal rate.

Vote on setting the 1981 tax rate at 28.5¢ per \$100 valuation was approved unanimously by the court.

Judge Crank noted that all funds from the 8.3¢ per \$100 for additional ad valorem will be used strictly for road and bridge and flood control, and that of the 20.5¢ per \$100 for the ad valorem roll, 17¢ will be assigned to debt service (courtroom restoration certificates of obligation) and 18.8¢ per \$100 for general maintenance.

a 241-acre lease in the Washington RR Survey.

W.E. Carl and Hawn Brothers have completed the No. 1 Elsie Cooper as a gas producer in a 165-acre lease in the 180000 Survey five miles south of Rock Island.

The well produced 810,000 cubic feet of gas per day on a 35 inch choke and the absolute open flow rate was 1,400,000 cubic feet per day. Production will be from two perforations at 4,600 to 5,800 feet and from 5,900 to 8,900 feet. The well was bottomed at 9,950 and plugged back to 9,015 feet.

New Teachers

Contracts were approved by the board for: Barbara Allen who holds a B.A. Degree from Southwest Texas State University majoring in English and Spanish, and with five years teaching experience, to teach English at Rice High School. She will fill a position vacated by Mrs. Lillian Gohlke who will become the school's new librarian.

Cynthia Jane Barta, with a B.A. Degree from Sam Houston State University, with no prior experience, was hired to fill a vacancy in the Homecoming Department at Rice High School where Mrs. Dorothy White resigned to devote full time to her family.

Joyce Rohan, with a B.A. Degree from Sam Houston and with three years prior experience, was hired to fill the position vacated by Mrs. Tise at Sheridan elementary school.

Wayne Webb with a B.A. Degree from the University of Arkansas and a Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree from the University of Arkansas School of Law, with 10 years prior experience in history and political science, was hired to teach World History at Rice High School.

Rosalinda Leos, with a B.A. Degree from Corpus Christi State University in elementary education and three years experience, was hired to fill a Title I position at Eagle Lake Primary School and will work with limited English speaking students.

County Tax Officer Hajovsky met with the court to present year-end reports from the tax department, and told the court that he hopes to have the tax statements ready to be mailed by October 1st. Hajovsky said that this might necessitate the renting of an additional billing machine for a month or so and noted that cost for rental would run about \$400 per month.

The tax officer received approval for year-end reports showing that there were a total of \$13,994.89 in delinquent personal taxes for the year of 1980 and \$47,811.39 delinquencies in real estate taxes. He also presented a supplemental assessed roll of \$3501.84; an assessed in error roll of \$8,802.96; a supplemental roll for 1979 taxes and a correction of an error in an assessed in error report of \$10.82.

That's 2.7 visitors every minute, nine hours a day, seven days a week.

Tom H. Taylor, chief of tourist bureaus operations concluded, "this could be the greatest tourist season Texas has ever had; for the state visitor industry, you could call it a billion-dollar summer."

A suit was filed in District Court in Columbus last Friday Aug. 7th by Bruce Hancock against Valero Energy Corp. seeking damages for allegedly trespassing on the plaintiff's property.

Hancock says in the petition that on May 1, 1981 the defendant entered on Hancock property without authority. The defendant had requested permission, but Hancock says the permission was denied and that the property was entered in a form of malicious trespass. He adds that oak trees, valued at \$25,000, were cut down during the operation.

The plaintiff asks for the \$25,000 in damages for loss of the trees plus \$75,000 in exemplary damages, plus costs of court and attorney's fee.

Rice Schools To Open Aug. 24; In-Service Starts Tues.

Officials of the Rice Consolidated School District remind that the opening of the 1981-82 school year will be on Monday, August 24th with classes beginning at the usual hour that morning and continuing until the normal dismissal hour at the respective schools.

Teachers and administrators will however begin four days of In-Service training on Tuesday, August 18th continuing through Friday, Aug. 21st.

The first six weeks period will end on October 2nd; the second on Nov. 19th; the third on Jan. 14; fourth on Feb. 26; fifth on April 7th; and the classes for the 1981-82 year will end on May 20th.

Other in-service dates for the faculty members will be on Nov. 16, Jan. 15, March 12 (countywide) and May 21. Holidays listed on the 1981-82 calendar include: Labor Day, Mon., Sept. 7; Thanksgiving, Thurs. and Fri., Nov. 26 and 27; Christmas-New Year's, Dec. 21-Jan. 1st; and Easter holidays, April 8th, 9th and 12th.

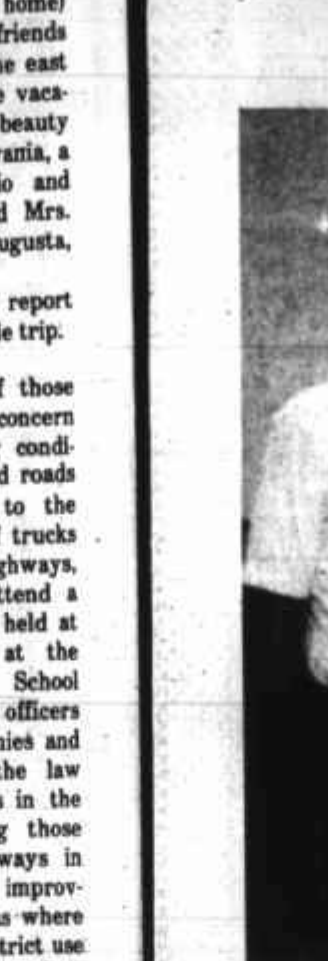

Bryant Gets 10Yr. Probation For Murder

4 Others Sentenced, 1 To Pen; Two Others Plead Guilty

District Judge B. B. Schraub presided in District Court in Columbus on Wednesday last week and heard two pleas of guilty and pronounced sentences on five persons, including a sentence assessed to Dorothy Bryant of Glidden on a charge of murder of her husband May 10th.

Mrs. Bryant entered a plea of guilty to the charge July 16th. In addition to the term of ten years of probation, she was assessed court costs.

Richard Eaton was given a term of less than two years more than five years in the Texas Department of Corrections for the burglary of the Garwood Lumber Company. He has been taken to Huntsville to begin serving the term.

Orville Williams, who also entered a guilty plea July 16th, was assessed a term of ten years of probation and ordered to make \$12,000 in restitution for issuing worthless checks to the Garwood Farmer Cooperative. He was also assessed costs of court for the 1978 indictment.

Robert Gossell, indicted for the theft of the car of R. F. (Buddy) Rau in Columbus April 11th, had entered a guilty plea July 16th and was given a term of five years of probation and assessed \$150.00 and pay costs of court.

Pleas Nolo Contendere
Guadalupe Pena, indicted in 1979 on a charge of involuntary manslaughter in the death of Mrs. Alecio Negrete of San Antonio in an accident Mar. 30, 1979 on IH-10, entered a plea of nolo contendere to a reduced charge of misdemeanor negligent homicide, and was assessed a year of probation and a \$500 fine, plus costs of court. Pena was driver of a U-Haul truck which collided with a station wagon and Mrs. Negrete was killed and two children critically injured in the accident.

Two Enter Guilty Pleas
Judge Schraub also heard guilty pleas from two others. David Teller entered a plea of guilty to an indictment of forgery for forging the name of Bob Ashby to Ashby Oil and Mud Company checks. He is due to be sentenced on Sept. 8th.

Darryl Mathis entered a plea of guilty to a charge of theft of a duty receipt from the Thirtieth Service Station in Columbus June 1, 1981. He also will be sentenced on Sept. 8th.
