### WCJC To Begin 36th Year Aug. 31

Wharton County Junior College in Wharton enters its 36th year as a comprehensive public community college for the Gulf Coast when 2,000 students are expected on campus Monday, August 31 to begin the fall semester.

Students who have not enrolled Tuesday or Wednesday, August 25-26 but should contact the registrar's office immediately to obtain a registration time permit. Phone (713) 532-4560.

No appointment is necessary to take advantage of the college's personal advancement and counseling services. Professional counselors are on duty weekdays from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. to assist prospective students in such areas as exploring career choices, choosing a major subject, and selecting a four-year college for transfer.

Registration for fall semester evening classes at WCJC is Monday, August 24 from 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building. Evening classes also start during the week of August 31. Courses include history, government, math, speech, engineering, biology, banking, data processing, business and office education, welding, drafting, criminal justice, real estate and mid-management.

The WCJC faculty convenes Monday, August 24 at 9 a.m. launching an intensive week-long staff development workshop prepared by the college Advanced Institutional Development Program headed by Dr. Ray Smith.

Freshman orientation sessions are scheduled August 27-28 with Student Government Association President Clifford Kinard of Bay City presiding. The Student Government Association will also host a "Welcome Assembly" Thursday, September 3 at 9:30 a.m. in the Pioneer Student Center.

August 27 is the last day to register for fall classes without paying a late fee. The college will observe its first holiday Monday, September 7 on Labor Day.

## EEA home helps Victoria couple save on electric bills 'without giving up comfortable living.'

Mr. and Mrs. Michael C. Buchhorn of 905 Blyth, Victoria, are glad they decided on a home built to meet standards of the Energy Efficiency Award (EEA) program developed by Central Power and Light Company.

"We wanted to save money on our electric bill, both in the short and long run," they say in explaining their choice of EEA. In addition, they "felt that with the EEA standards we would get better construction quality... and use it as a good selling tool when we sell our home."

Now that they've been in their house awhile, they're in a good position to evaluate it. And they would recommend an EEA home to others "because it will save you money on your operating expenses" and the EEA standards do not add much cost to your basic house construction.

The Buchhorns opted for a heat pump for their all-electric house; this high efficiency equipment results in lower operating expenses for heating and air conditioning. Other energy-saving features include adequate insulation, taping of outside seams before bricking, and caulking and sealing to prevent movement of air through joints, holes and cracks.

What do they like best about their EEA home?

"We like the lower bills we receive without giving up comfortable living," they write.

"We set our thermostat to keep our two children comfortable and our bill is still lower than [for our previous] house. Our old house, which used gas heat and water-heating, was about 800 square feet smaller and had approximately the same total energy bill as our new EEA home."
