firm did not initially install the system but had been called to do emergency-type repairs under instructions of the contractor, Circle Double (C) of Woodlands.

Willrodt said in his summary letter that "the equipment was made by the Edwards Manufacturing Company and they paid for at least three service calls and numerous equipment components in an effort to stand behind their product, before discovering that the entire system was not originally installed by a qualified electronics expert under whom all work would be properly done and complete authority to perform a lasting Fire Detection System guaranteed to function."

The project director also presented a log of efforts he had made to meet with the contractor to iron out the alarm system problem. Charles A. Clark, owner of the contracting firm, had informed Willrodt by certified mail, that he would be available to meet relative to the matter on the date of Monday's meeting, but prior to the meeting informed the director that he could not make the meeting and requested a conference at a later time.

County Judge Lester J. Crane and Commissioners Otto Loessin, Rafael Veselka, Jerome Wicke and Bill Stiles, indicated a desire to get the project completed since the alarm system has been delaying final acceptance of the project for many months. As a result of this desire, the court authorized Willrodt and P&S Engineering to take steps to get the corrections made or system replaced as soon as possible.

The contract price for the project was \$687,200 and the court received an allowance credit, making the contract cost \$684,559.00. Of that amount the court has paid \$660,211.26 (including a \$50,000 payment approved last month), leaving a balance of \$24,347.74 unpaid. Willrodt pointed out in his report that this is \$652.26 short of the recommended \$25,000 holdback until completion of the alarm system. However it was further noted that the contractor contends that he is due \$9,857.70 for changes made in the plans and/or specifications, thus adding enough funds withheld to exceed the \$25,000 recommended holdback.

Changovers Questioned
Willrodt questioned some of the fifteen change-over orders as possibly made without authority or "too high" in cost. The court indicated that it would not consider payment of any of the changeovers until a satisfactory agreement can be reached between the court, the project director and the contractor.

Also, Willrodt informed the court that he has received information that subcontractors' fees amounting to approximately \$3,500 remain unpaid by the contractor. The court approved the \$50,000 payment last month in order to enable the contractor to pay off sub-contractors from whom he had been holding back the ten percent amount, which the county had been retaining until final completion.

When the alarm system is successfully completed, it is anticipated that the court will take action for final acceptance of the project, almost one year later than had been anticipated.

County Judge Lester J. Crane also commented on a report from the Emergency Ambulance Corps. The three units at Weimar, Columbus and Eagle Lake made a total of 63 calls (or runs) during August of 1981. This included 28 in Columbus, 22 in Eagle Lake and 13 in Weimar.

Costs of the runs totaled \$3,273; however, \$987 was collected for current and past due ambulance service accounts during the month.
